#### A Prophetic Poem.

Rupert Brooke Foreshadowed Death in Last Work.

A stoker was leaning against the A couple of years ago a romantic looking young chap, with rosy cheeks and a tremendous sombrero hat, drifted into a few Canadian cities and was introduced as one of the poets of the vounger English school Rupert Brooke was undoubtedly a real poet. Now and again he left an autograph volume of his verse among friends as he travelled about; then he went back to England to write more verse. When the war broke out the young poet went aboard a war-ship in the naval brigade that went to the relief of Antwerp last fall. Afterwards he drifted on a warship down to the Dardanelles, where he died of sunstroke, just about the time that an almost prophetic and very colored poem of his appeared in New Numbers. This little poem is chock-ful of tender sentiment, and it well proves that in a struggle like this the proves that in a struggle like this the highest emotions of a free patriot people are roused to action that leaves the pen and shoulders the rifle. Morgan and Company criticized in regard to the contracts?" he was asked.

"There could be no criticism of the nanner in which Morgan and Company handled the war supplies contract." he replied, "because it was understood that they would award only those in the United States." Sir Thomas went on to say that the

Canadian Pacific would act in Canada for the British Government in a similiar manner to what J. P. Morgan and Company were doing in the United States, being an intermediary in the accumulation of supplies.

"It is the intention of the road's officials," he said, "to construct the manufacturing equipment of the company so that it can make any sort of naterial that may be called for by the War Office. The staff of the Purchasing Department will be placed at the disposition of the Government and the officials will see to the shipment of all supplies and war munitions.

"At the present time all the vessels elonging to the steamship department have been taken over by the Admiralty for carrying troops and stores and I shall arrange to charter f tonnage to handle the crops, which we expect to be 25 per cent. greater than they have ever been before." Speaking of conditions in England,

Sir Thomas said there had not been such a great shortage of ammunition as had been reported, and the outlook for the war was more hopeul than people had been led to expect. The English manufacturers move a little slowly in converting their plants, but now plenty of skilled labor was coming and there would be no further delay in making and
