ABUSE OF THE EYES.

There is seldom a white blouse that is not improved by a touch of black. One-piece loose-fitted robe and sash draped effects are still in great demand.

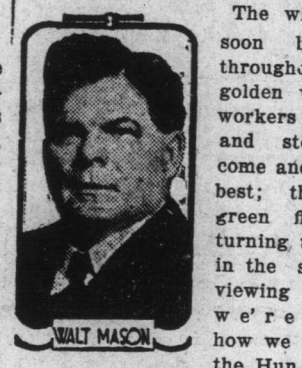
