PUBLIC NOTICE.

Tenders will be received at this office until Noon on Saturday, the 24th of May, 1919, for a suitable steamer for the Mail Service in the District of Fogo. The boat must be about 90 tons net measurement, and could draw not more than 11 feet when loaded. She is to class X10, built at Lloyds, (England) and to have a speed of at least 10 knots; to be equipped with all modern improvements and have accommodation for about 40 passengers. The service to commence as soon as possible this year, and in other years to commence about the 1st of May, and end about the 31st of December. Service to consist of one round trip each week between St. John's and Fogo, with intermediate ports. The contract to be for a term of ten years, to be computed from the date of commencement of the service. Tenders to specify the rate per round trip at which such service will be performed, which rate must include the board of the Government Mail Officer. Mr. Vivian's Lecture.

A large gathering including Rev. Field, Rev. J. Brinton, Rev. Monilton, Chief Justice Horwood and other prominent citizens, attended the lecture on "The Home of the Fleet," given by Rev. N. G. Vivian at the Synod Hall last night. The lecturer, who is a native of Trinidad, spent over three years with the fleet, being attached to one of the ships as Chaplain. In an address which lasted almost two hours, the speaker lectured in a most interesting and entertaining manner described various harbors, their points of interest, such as old churches, etc., number, class and armaments of the ships composing each unit of the fleet, the special work of each, the manner of protecting the harbors by use of the services of the enemy raiders, and the manner in which they were met and dealt with, and the heroic conduct of the men at all times. The lecture was illustrated with numerous fine views. Mr. W. N. Gray operating the machine perfectly. Following the concert a musical dialogue, the "Surrender of the German Fleet" was given by Mr. P. D. Gray, Mr. T. P. Halley assisting at the piano. The piece was an appropriate one and splendidly delivered and was received with warm applause. A vote of thanks to the lecturer was proposed by the chairman, Mr. J. O. Outerbridge, who referred to Newfoundland as the training ground of the Navy since the days of Cabot. Mr. William Horwood, in seconding the motion, spoke of Newfoundland's contributions to the Navy, and paid a high tribute to their worth, whether engaged as mine-sweepers, on patrol duty or in any other capacity. He noted the testimony of various officers to show that they ably did their part in maintaining Britain's command of the seas. The vote, in which Mr. Halley was included, was heartily

accorded, as was a similar vote proposed by Mr. House to Sir Jos. Outerbridge. The evening closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Illustrated Lecture.

The illustrated lecture given in the Methodist College Hall last night by the Rev. W. H. Barraclough, B.A., of Moncton, N.B., who is here in the interest of missions, was well attended and was presided over by the Governor. On the platform with his Excellency and the lecturer were Capt. Baird, A.D.C., Dr. Bond, Hon. S. Milley and Mr. Arthur Mews, C.M.G. The lecturer on being introduced, spoke of the good feeling and fellowship existing between the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland and extended greetings on behalf of Canada to Newfoundland's oldest Colony. The introduction was brief and to the point, and the lecturer went immediately into his subject, "The Sunset Side of the Rockies." About 140 views were shown; each one being explained briefly. The clear, lucid and eloquent explanation, together with the splendid views made the lecture very interesting. His Excellency moved a vote of thanks to the lecturer which was carried by acclamation and Mr. G. F. Grimes, M.H.A., moved and Mr. W. Clarke seconded, a vote of thanks to his Excellency the Governor, which was carried by a rising vote. The National Anthem brought the meeting to a close.
