B. the closing of Baker's Chop House and the City Arms, it cut away a big part of the old resorts of the shipping trade. You could usually see ships' officers and shipping clerks at the City Arms, shipping underwriters and shipping agents at Baker's, and the heads of shipping businesses at the Ship and Turtle, where many shipping deals have been sealed in the past by a bottle of wine. The Ship hostelry dates back to Richard the Second's time; the Turtle only entered the title last century, when the house was rebuilt. The ground landlord is still, I believe, the trustee and warden of Rochester Bridge, to whom it was bequeathed in mediaeval times by two City merchants for the building and upkeep of a stone bridge over the river Medway. The old India House stood opposite the restaurant and its record as a shipping trade rendezvous goes very far back. The proprietors owned Crosby Hall and much of the plate and glass came from there and from other old City
