Legislative Council.

Monday, May 10.

The House met at 4.30.

The second reading of Bill entitled "An Act Respecting the Department of Public Works," was deferred.

A message from the Assembly intimated that the following Bills had been passed by that body and asking the sanction of the Council:

A Bill entitled "An Act to Provide for the Better Standardization of Codfish"; a Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the better obtaining of information respecting the Codfishery"; a Bill entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Women's Patriotic Association"; a Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 11 of the Consolidated Statutes, 3rd Series, entitled 'Of the Department of Marine and Fisheries'."

These were read a first time to be read a second time to-morrow.

Copies of Report of the Minister of Agriculture for 1919 were laid on the table by the leader of the Government Hon. Geo. Shea.

Hon. Mr. Grieve read some correspondence between Mr. R. B. Job and himself re his speech on the Fisheries Regulations.

The House then adjourned till 4.30 p.m. to-day.

As the North Sees It.

ST. JOHN'S CONDITION. — It isn't altogether a "clinch" living in our one and only little city these days.

St. John's folks seem to have no coal; there is little or no hay for the horses; potatoes are scarce and prices are going skyward as fast as they can. Outports have their disadvantages, but just now it is better to live in an outport than in St. John's. Some of our business men who are at present in the city, report that prices are so high they have not yet begun buying.

There is a fairly good remedy for the disease of high prices, and our American cousins are adopting a plan that is likely to prove more effective at reducing prices than all the Royal Commissions, Control Boards and all the rest. The overall movement is attaining very large proportions, and parades of men and women in overalls and gingham dresses, escorted by bands with the bandmen in overalls, and marshalled by policemen in overalls have taken place in American cities. As a result a topping in dry goods prices is reported.

We may use a similar method, and though there is no need for anything so drastic as the overall movement, careful buying of only real necessities will have more effect on prices than anything.

Most people need no warning, their straightened purses being warning enough.

THE WOODFORD AFFIDAVIT. — The more one reads of the Woodford affidavit the more one is puzzled as to who is the liar.

The facts are now fairly plain, but instead of simplifying matters they only confuse. A brief history of matters stands as follows:

The Woodford affidavit presented to the court, in which Woodford swore that he had been promised a Government job in return for resigning his seat and the case against him would be withdrawn.

Three weeks elapse, and on the night on which a public meeting was to be held in the Star Hall to discuss the matter, an announcement was made that the Governor, advised by his ministers, was appointing a Royal Commission to enquire into the case.

On the opening of the "House" Premier Squires denies that he offered Woodford any job or made any arrangement.

The Minister of Justice announces that he had cabled legal authorities in London, and that "even if the charges against Mr. Squires were true," it was not criminal under Newfoundland law.

Premier Squires may be perfectly innocent—we sincerely hope, for the sake of the morality of our Legislature, which has reached a low ebb; but he is successfully white washed by the Royal Commission; but the ambiguity of the whole affair, when the Minister of Justice takes the trouble to cable London, regarding a matter which the Premier declares is absolutely untrue, must make people wonder.

The whole affair needs clearing up, and clearing up quickly.
