Rawlinson Routs Gang of Clever Gem Thieves.

POPULAR STAR HAS ONE OF BEST ROLES OF CAREER IN "THE BLACK BAG."

The old saying that it takes a thief to catch a thief is suggested at the start of Herbert Rawlinson's latest Universal special production, "The Black Bag," which will be shown at the Star Theatre to-day. A clever gang of thieves has set itself to trap a pretty girl thought to have stolen a diamond necklace. Then Rawlinson as Billy Kirkwood comes along and knocks the theory completely out. It is plain from the beginning except to the real thieves, that Kirkwood is no thief, and yet he outthinks and outwits them all the way through.

"The Black Bag" is a fascinating photoplay adapted to the screen from the novel by Louis Joseph Vance. The story concerns a young business man who falls in love with a girl he is afterward told has stolen a costly string of gems. He surprises the leader of the criminal band ransacking the girl's home. Kirkwood overpowers the burglar and takes the gems to his own hotel room, whence they are stolen again by a woman accomplice of the man Kirkwood had recently left. Municipal Council.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and the full Board of Councillors was present.

After the usual preliminaries of the meeting, the following matters received consideration.

Messrs. McGrath & McGrath, Solicitors, on behalf of St. Michael's Orphanage, asked that a definite time be set for the arbitration on land expropriated by the Council some time ago. The City Engineer's Department is at present preparing the necessary plans and other data on the many properties expropriated, which will be tabled at the next regular meeting. Arrangements will then be made for the Arbitrations with a view to settlement of claims.

S. O. Steele & Sons wrote calling attention to the damage done their premises through surface water. The City Engineer will investigate and report.

Permits to repair dwellings were granted as follows:—H. Parsons, Pleasant Street; C. F. Chancey, Alexander Street, subject to the approval of the City Engineer.

James Shields' application to rebuild stable, Portugal Cove Road, was referred to the Department of Public Health.

The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer and on the usual conditions:—Dwelling, J. R. Chalker, Quill's Road; rear extension John Larkin, Queen's Road.

The Mobile watershed was again the subject of discussion, and it was ordered that a survey of the property be immediately proceeded with.

Orders were given for the removal of the old fishmarket, Steer's Cove, and the placing of the new market on the site decided upon.

The City Engineer's report for the week was read. He stated that the work on the new pipe line was very satisfactory. 1000 feet of excavation had been done and 200 feet of 20 inch pipe laid to date, and that the balance of the work would likely be completed within the next week. He also stated that the Venturi Meter recorded a water supply of six and a half million gallons per day, and that the Lake level has fallen 85 ft. below crest.

The closing of streets was talked over, and it was suggested that Military Road, from Cavendish Sq. to Victoria Street, needed attention in this respect. If the allocation will permit this work will be proceeded

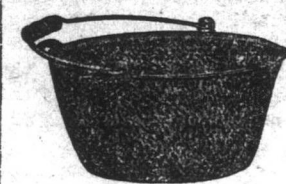

Peas for salad should be peeled

ed and put in the refrigerator to get chilled and firm several hours before they are to be served.

Sweet-pickled gooseberries are a delicious winter relish. Use nine pounds of sugar and one pint of vinegar to six pounds of gooseberries.

To lobster or chicken salad add some chopped celery which has been bleached in cold water to which a few drops of lemon juice have been added.

Quartered fresh peaches, halves of white grapes, sliced fresh strawberries, and shredded almonds make an exceptionally tempting fruit salad.

Combine shaved and crisped cabbage with shredded pineapple, almonds and pimentos, and serve on lettuce leaves with mayonnaise or boiled dressing.

Arrange corned-beef hash in mounds with slight hollows in the centers, and into each cavity drop an egg. Place under a broiler until the eggs have set.

When Hamburg steak balls are being broiled and are about half done add to the pan several slices of green tomatoes, bacon and bananas, and finish broiling.

A cold sea platter is a wise choice on a warm day, if one can be sure of getting fresh fish. Large ripe tomatoes stuffed with crab salad might be served with boneless sardines on crisp lettuce.
