### Raw Fur Sales

Beaver Skins Brought the Best Prices at Auction in New York Yesterday.

New York, May 13.—Active bidding for beaver was the outstanding feature of the second day of the auction of raw furs here. Medium-sized skins sold relatively better than larger ones but the entire collection moved well. Top prices for beaver were \$37.75, and general prices averaged 10 per cent. above winter sale level. No comparison was made on the marmot offering, but all other furs sold during the day declined. Best offer brought \$32.50. This offering dropped 10 per cent., as did Kollinsky. Best ermine touched \$2.84, but the collection was off 15 per cent. from winter sale prices. Squirrel dropped twenty per cent., and nutria was off 15 per cent., although best fetched \$5.10.

### Supreme Court

(Before Mr. Justice Kent.)  
The Newfoundland Banking and Trust Corporation, Plaintiffs, and Reid Nfld. Co. Ltd., Mines and Forests (Newfoundland), Ltd., and the Newfoundland Power and Paper Co. Ltd., Defendants.

This is an application on behalf of plaintiffs for an order giving leave to amend statement of claim. Mr. J. G. Higgins is heard in support of the motion. Mr. C. E. Hunt for the Reid Nfld. Co. consents to the order but asks that time for filing of defence be extended for eight days. Mr. H. A. Winter for Nfld. Power and Paper Co. Ltd., Mr. E. Jerrett for Mines and Forests, Ltd., are heard in support of Mr. Hunt's arguments. Mr. Higgins is heard in reply.

It is ordered that plaintiffs have leave to amend the statement of claim, and that time for defence be extended to May 31st. It is also ordered that costs incurred in the motion be paid by plaintiff.

Counsel for both sides intimated that the hearing of the case would take place in June.  
Mr. Howley, K.C., and L. E. Emerson who were in England and Montreal taking evidence on commission will return in a few days. The above case involves about three million dollars, and is by far the most important from a monetary standpoint that has ever come before the Supreme Court of Newfoundland.

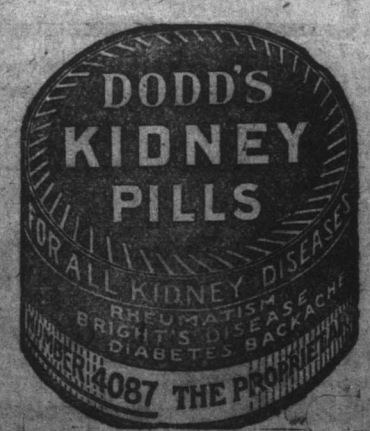

### Radio Owners Complain of Interruptions

Many complaints are made by the owners of radio sets in the city because of interruptions caused by the operator at St. Pierre, Station H.Y.S. It is said that the messages sent out in morse code from that station are on a 450 metre wave length and in consequence causes considerable interference with local receiving sets, as it is impossible to cut them out. British, American, Canadian and Newfoundland ships, we understand, are prohibited from using a 450 wave length within 250 miles of their coasts and, without desiring to make an international question of the matter, we would suggest the authorities in St. Pierre might be notified of the inconvenience, with a view to ascertaining if it is possible to overcome it.

### Forget-Me-Not Day

Arrangements are now being finalized for the annual Forget-me-not Day which is being held this year, on June 30th. The day will be recognized all over the island and it is hoped that a substantial sum will be realized, as the object is a worthy one, mainly to provide funds to help disabled war veterans and their dependents.
