# Canada the World's **Food Producer**

One of the convincing facts disclosed by the International Live Stock Exposition and Hay and Grain Show, held at Chicago, is the importance of the farmer as a producer of the food supply of the nation. In an address broadcast through a Chicago radio station, Fred James, assistant director of publicity of the department of immigration and colonization of Canada, declared that the exposition, the greatest of its kind, helps to place the farmers of the United States and Canada in the position of importance in the perspective of public opinion and appreciation to which they are entitled. At this Exposition and Show farmers from all parts of the United States and Canada enter the best of their live stock and field products, and in this friendly competition each undoubtedly learns something from the other to their mutual advantage. The event is one of the best opportunities offered to Canada to demonstrate to the people of the United States its importance as a producer of the highest quality foodstuffs. Last year Canada won the world's championship for wheat for the thirteenth time, 25 out of the 30 prizes for Hard Spring wheat; 25 out of 30 prizes for oats; first prizes for Alfalfa, flax, peas and flint corn. The majority of the honors for sheep, and some of the most coveted ribbons for other live stock went to Canadian exhibitors.

Because of the fact that the harvest of 1925 gave a yield of 422,000,000 bushels of wheat, Canada again will be making a significant contribution to the world's food supply. Of this huge crop from less than 22,000,000 acres, over 90 per cent. is Hard Spring wheat. The United States finds itself this year with a considerably smaller wheat crop than a year ago and a shortage of about 50,000,000 bushels to meet the food seeding purposes, is anticipated. This shortage will naturally be supplied from Canada, now the largest wheat exporting country in the world. Canada had the advantage in this market because of the superior quality of its wheat and close proximity and lower freight rates. It is significant that last month for the first time since the U.S. Tariff on Canadian wheat was raised to 42 cents per bushel a considerable quantity was exported to the United States for the purpose of consumption.

In addition to a large wheat crop the Dominion has phenomenal yields of oats, barley, rye, and other grain and field crops. But wheat is not the only food product that Canada is exporting to the United States. For the twelve months ending September 30, 1925, the total value of Canadian exports to the United States was \$450,-000,000 of which about one-fourth was agricultural and food products. Each succeeding year shows an increasing demand from the United States for the products of the Canadian farms and orchards. The natural and spacous pasture areas of Western Canada are the most economic source of supply of feeder cattle for farmers of the corn-growing States. These cattle were being sent to the American buyers until a few years ago. When the demand again becomes acute, as it inevitably will, due to the growth of the U.S. population the importance of Canada as a source of supply of stocker cattle to the farmers of the United States will be more fully an-

preciated.

There are some people who are inclined to think that Canada's productive area is a limited acreage comparatively close to the border of the United States. But Canada has breadth as well as length. In area it is larger than the United States. Alaska and the Philippine Islands. While it is true that a large part of the 3,729,665 square miles which comprise the Dominion of Canada lies in the far north and must be regarded as non-productive from an agricultural point of view it is also true that the non-productive area is being reduced as scientific agriculture advances. The discovery of marquis wheat, which now forms fully 90 per cent, of the spring wheat grown in Canada and 65 per cent, of that grown in the United States, made possible the growing of wheat on a productive basis farther north than was ever thought possible. Canada now has a new wheat known as Garnet, which will ripen from ten days to two weeks earlier than Marquis, is more resistant to drought and wet weather, equally productive, with as good milling qualities and can be grown with the assurance of good yields still further north than the present areas of production.

It is estimated that Canada has 300,000,000 acres of land suitable for farming. Only 60,000,000 acres are under cultivation. Of the 240,000,000 acres awaiting settlement millions of very fertile acres are close to railways capable of growing grains, including corn, and excellently suited for mixed farming and raising live stock. This land can be purchased at prices ranging from \$15, to \$29 an acre. The population of Canada is under 10,000,-000 or less than three persons to the square mile in the United States. It seems logical to assume that even with the normal increase of the present large population of the United States it will not be long before this country will have to rely upon other lands to supply a greater part of the essentiNew Floor Canvas patterns.
