

It is only eighteen years age that Luther Atwood first made coaff oil and offered it for sale; and it was four years later that it came into use for illuminating purposes. Twe years later still, or twelve years ago, the manufactured products of the Pennsylvania wells came into the market. The figures which represent the trade of to-day is enormous. From the Pennsylvania oil region, which has been farther developed than any other, because of the priority of its discovery, and its commercial facilities, there was shipped last year 5,700,000 barrels, or 228,000,000 gallons, of which 3,890,326 barrels were exported. Of this quantity, 94,955,550 gallons passed through the New York market, 55,801,590 gallons through Philadelphia, and only 2,185,096 through Boston.
