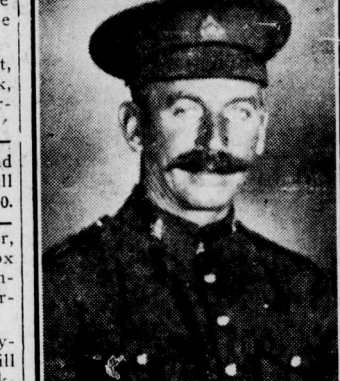

Sapper Anderson had quite a career in military life, and feels that he has now done his bit for the empire. He first joined the 4th Battalion of the 42nd Black Watch, then the Imperial Yeomanry and went through the Boer War, for which he wears a medal and five bars. At the close of this war he came to Canada, married and settled down. At the outbreak of the present war he joined the 33rd Battalion and went to England in March 1916. He spent some nine months in France and has remained to the finish. He was in the Rhyel riot and claims the soldiers had ample reason to act as they did. One of the principle causes of the trouble was the fact that the authorities were sending home conscript men before those who had volunteered and had been fighting for months. Food was also scarce, as well as tobacco. He says that after the riot these things were plentiful.
