Then, turning the weapon upon himself, he fired again and fell dead beside her. CHICAGO STRIEE COLLAPED.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—At noon to-day the collapse of every rail road strike in the city occurred, and work in the stock yards began in earnest. The Chicago and Alton switchmen recognized their mistake, and went back to work as a result of a conference between General Manager Campbell, Grand Master Sween y. Vice-Grand Master Downey and a committee of the strikers. The men agree to become members of the Switchmen's Union to be hereafter governed by its rule and by the advice of its chief, to reirain from trying to dictate to the company in the matter of hiring or promoting men, but with the right to appeal to the officers of the company for redress of grievances, the latter agreeing to hear such complaints in a spirit of fairness. The switchmen at the stock yards held a meeting during the morning, and declared the atrike of, to go into effect at 1 o'clock. The lake Shore strike is, virtually settled, 47 of the men having signed the agreement to do work as ordered. This leaves about twenty whose places are being filled. These men will not be taken back. The road is moving freight without inconvenience.
