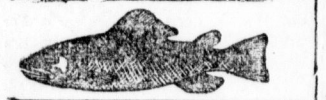

THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 7.—The pressure is increasing in Eastern Canada and is high over the lake district. Fine weather and moderate temperatures are general from the lakes to the Atlantic. In the Northwest it is fair and warm and a small but important depression is passing over Assiniboia eastward.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 44°—68°; Qu'Appelle, 42°—68°; Prince Albert, 40°—68°; Winnipeg, 48°—68°; Port Arthur, 56°—66°; Toronto, 49°—63°; Kingston, 52°—62°; Montreal, 54°—62°; Quebec, 52°—65°; Halifax, 62°—74°.

When Galt Was Head of Navigation.

[Galt Report.]

An old document bearing date April 11, 1854, is lying in our hands, dealing with the time when the flour made at Shade's mill in Galt was shipped down the Grand River to Dunville, destined for passage through the Welland Canal. The first certificate clears four, what were then called "arks" laden with 1,512 barrels of flour, whereof Mr. (James K.) Andrews was master, through the canal to Port Dalhousie, and the second clears the "Ark of Galt," laden with 412 barrels of flour, of which Mr. A. Shade, was master, also through the canal to Port Dalhousie. The "arks," of course, only navigated the river during the high water, but owing to the fact that the northern country through which the river runs was quite uncolonized, the rise and fall of the water was very gradual and "navigation" was possible for two or three months.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—“O'Dowd's Neighbors” on Sept. 9 will be one of the best attractions at the Grand this season. The plan is now open.

A number of Londoners attended a ball given at Port Stanley last night by the leaders of St. Thomas. They returned this morning.

The funeral of the late Mrs. A. S. Abbott took place on Monday at Mount Pleasant Cemetery and was largely attended. The services were taken by Rev. George Boyd and Rev. Dr. Sanderson. The pall-bearers were the late grandsons of the deceased.

At an important meeting of the Canadian Council of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in Toronto, the invitation of the Kingston chapters to hold the convention of 1893 at that city was accepted. Reports from all parts of Canada showed this aggressive Anglican organization to be doing an excellent work.

Ontario Fish and Game.

An abstract of the Ontario Fish and Game Acts has been mailed to all postmasters, customs officers, railway stations, hotels, gunsmiths and game dealers' stores throughout the Province, in order that the public may be made aware of the amendments passed during the last session of the Ontario Legislature. The commissioners are very anxious to protect and preserve the game and fish that still remain in the Province, and to that end will rigidly prosecute any person, sportsman or others who may be found guilty of violating the law. A. D. Stewart, chief game and fish warden, court house, Hamilton, will mail copies of the law to any one inquiring for the same.

Local Legal.

The following cases were heard yesterday at Osgoode Hall:

Jackson vs. Buffalo Trust and Loan Co. E. R. Cameron (London), for the defendant, moved to vacate a lis pendens registered against lands in question, no steps having been taken since the issue of the writ of summons a year ago. G. W. Marsh (London), for the plaintiff, contra. Reserved.

Re Alger and Sarnia Oil Co.—E. R. Cameron (London), for General Alger, moved to set aside a notice of appeal from a former order made by Robertson, J. G. W. Marsh (London) for the defendant, contra. D. MacMillan, Q. C., for the liquidator of the company. Reserved.

Weekes vs. Frayley—Rowell, for the plaintiff, moved for an order authorizing the receiver appointed by the court to accept the surrender value of an insurance policy on the life of the defendant, the receiver having been appointed to receive the defendant's interest under the policy. E. D. Armour, Q. C., for another creditor of the defendant, E. R. Cameron (London), for the children of the defendant, in whose favor the defendant has made a declaration that the policy is for their benefit. After argument, the motion was enlarged for one week to cross-examine the defendant on his affidavit.

Lewis vs. Landed Banking and Loan Company—Mackelcan, Q. C., for the defendant, moved to bar the claimant in an interpleader issue, the claimant, who is the plaintiff, not having proceeded to trial. E. R. Cameron (London) for the plaintiff, W. H. Blake for the sheriff. The plaintiff undertaking to go to trial at next Sandwich Assizes, the motion was dismissed. Costs in the cause.

LABOR TROUBLES.

Monday night after 11:30 p.m. about 50 of the motormen and conductors employed by the Hamilton Electric Street Car Company met and formed an association called "The Canada Street Car Employees' Association." The association is formed for the mutual benefit and protection of the employees. It was hoped that the directors of the company would help instead of hindering the formation of such an association, but several of the supposed leaders in the association were discharged on Tuesday. The employees claim they have not been well used by the company and are compelled to work 15 hours a day four days in the week and refused extra pay for over time. They claim the association was not formed to force the company to submit to their demands but intended as a benefit association in case of sickness, etc., and also to have their grievances redressed before the directors for consideration.

The statement that 100 Slavs returned to work at Homestead on Monday is denied by the strikers and also by officials of the company.

The differences between employers and employed at the salt works near Norwich, Eng., which culminated last night in fighting between strikers and non-union employees, have been settled.

The Elba iron works at Pittsburgh, Pa., which were closed down last week on account of a strike of the amalgamated men, are expected to resume operations as a non-union mill.

The Sullivan and Corbett fight, which takes place this evening, will be bulletined at the expiration of each round by special wire at 204 Richmond street.

Late Canadian News

Provisions of the Late Sir Daniel Wilson's Will.

—The late Sir Daniel Wilson's will, which was proved in the Supreme Court of Ontario on Monday, provides for the distribution of his estate among his family and for the establishment of a fund for the benefit of the poor of the city of London.

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
