sure area from the Northwest is now over
the lakes and is moving southward and
is causing light local snowfalls in this dis-
trict. In eastern Canada the pressure is
about normal with fair weather. In the
Northwest fine cold weather and high
pressure prevails.

—Mr. Thos. Hodgson, the well-known
Montreal merchant, is visiting Mr. J. W.
Little, city.

—Mrs. Will R. Hobbs and her sister,
Miss Foster, have gone to their home in
Waterford to spend Christmas and New
Years.

—A special train of palace horse-cars passed
through here. They contained among
others Stamboul, Cricket, Alma Mater and
Nancy Lee, the dam of Nancy Hanks.
They will be sold in New York this week.

—The secretary of the Western Ontario
Bible Society, Rev. J. R. Orne, of London,
visited the Vienna branch on the 14th inst.
His excellent address at the meeting was
appreciated. The branch reported pro-
gress.

—Oliver Jeffrey, a young man of Elythe-
wood, was removed to the London asylum
on Saturday. Jeffrey was taken there once
before and while on the train got away
from his keeper and jumped, breaking his
arm.

—The name of ex-Mayor Murray Ander-
son, one of the oldest manufacturers in
Canada, is favorably mentioned in connec-
tion with the Canadian commission-
ership to the World's Fair. There are few who
know more about Ontario than ex-Mayor
Anderson.

—Fred Grant, son of Assessment Com-
missioner Stephen Grant, was returning
from a walk to Hellmuth College yester-
day afternoon when he stumbled over a
stone, sustaining a fracture of the leg just
above the ankle. Dr. Mitchell attended the
young man.

—While Judge Davis was riding in Lon-
don township yesterday he was thrown
from his horse and rendered insensible. He
was afterwards brought to his home,
corner St. James and Waterloo streets.
A severe cut on the head from which blood
flowed freely, was the most serious injury.

—A very old resident of London in the
person of Mrs. Margaret Donnelly died last
evening, aged 83 years. She was well
known throughout the city. The funeral
will take place on Tuesday morning to St.
Peter's Cathedral from the residence of her
daughter, Mrs. S. Povey, 531 William
street.

—Rev. Dr. Sexton, of New York,
preached in the First Congregational
Church yesterday. His subject in the
morning was "Soul Solitariness"; in the
evening, "Light at Eventide." Both ser-
mons were highly appreciated. He will
lecture Tuesday night on the "Follies and
Fruits of the Age."

—Hon. John Dryden, Hon. Thos. Bal-
lantine, ex-Gov. Hoard, Professors Robert-
son, Fletcher, Dean and others, will be
in Western Chalmers' Convention in
London on Jan. 10, 11 and 12 next. Every
dayman in Western Ontario should make
an endeavor to be present. Reduced fares
can be had on all railways.

—The anniversary and tea-meeting in
connection with the Methodist Church,
(the Wesleyan) on 4, of Deane's town-
ship, will be held on Sunday and Tuesday, Jan.
1 and 3. The Sunday services will be con-
ducted by Rev. Messrs. Hazen and George,
and the platform meeting on Tuesday even-
ing will be addressed by popular speakers.
The North street choir will supply the
music. Adult tickets, 35 cents. J. M.
Kaiser, secretary.

—Speaking of Cleveland's marine inter-
ests the Leader says: "Another project on
foot will soon assume definite proportions.
Capitalists of this city, who have leased the
London and Port Stanley Railroad, have
determined to run in connection with it a
line of steamers between Port Stanley and
Cleveland. The boats will be constructed
to carry passengers and freight, the latter
being mainly coal, which will be shipped in
large quantities."

—Saturday night, on the Wortley road,
a drunken man drove into the horse and
rig of Mr. Burns, of the firm of Stevens &
Burns. Mrs. Burns was thrown out under
the horse's feet and narrowly escaped be-
ing stamped upon. As it was she was
severely bruised and shaken up. Dr.
Ferguson, who was called to her aid, does
not fear any serious after-effects. Mr.
Burns was also thrown out, but pluckily
held on to one of the reins until the shafts
broke and the horse freed himself, which
saved him from becoming entangled in the
wreck. The name of the intoxicated driver
is not known.

finance minister, for the mayor's chair in
1893, seems to be endorsed by the large
majority of the electors. Everywhere it is
being endorsed. On Saturday evening two
large and representative meetings of his
supporters were held. In Trebilcock's
hall, Mr. H. Horseman presided at an
assembly of electors in the sixth ward,
at which steps were taken to promote the
candidature of Ald. Gartschore, and a
similar gathering of No. 3 ward electors
was held at Culler hall, Wellington street.
Every section of the electorate was re-
presented at both meetings. Arrangements
are in progress for organization in other wards.
As the election takes place two weeks from
today, there is not much time to waste.

Militia General Orders.

The following pointed observations ap-
pear in the militia general orders issued:
Commanding officers of permanent corps
are held responsible that all non-commis-
sioned officers and men under their com-
mand are at all times in possession of a
complete kit, and that all the articles com-
posing it are of the regulation pattern.
The major-general has observed, in the
course of his inspection of the militia, the
neglect of efficient and practical kit
inspection. The object of such
inspections is to ascertain that the
men are in possession of the articles which
it is considered necessary for them to have
for the purpose of cleanliness and order, and
to see that these articles are constantly
maintained in such a state as to admit of
the men taking the field at any time with-
out the necessity for fresh issues.

He has further observed with regret an
absence of care in watching over the inter-
ests of the men. Articles of inferior
quality are provided for the men by contractors,
to whom the men are then called upon to
pay extra in order to obtain a serviceable
article. Such transactions are simply a
fraud upon the soldier, from which it is the
duty of every officer to protect his men.

Commanding officers will bring to the
notice of the major-general all cases in
which the price charged to soldiers for
articles of clothing or necessities appears
in excess of the proper market value of
such articles, and the cases where articles
received from contractors or from militia
stores fail to last the prescribed time.
The policy of weeding out non-effective
corps is still being pursued. Richmond
(Quebec) Field Battery of Artillery, the
Central St. Marie half-battalion of Mountain
Artillery, the Lunenburg Garrison Battery,
No. 3 Quebec Garrison Battery and the
Montreal Company of Engineers are
gazetted out.

PRESBYTERIANS AND CONGREGA-

TIONALISTS UNITING.

John Burton, B. D., in which he presents

are nearest akin might with reasonable
deliberation be brought about in due time.
For instance, Mr. Burton thinks that Con-

Cholera On Wings.

One mystery of the dissemination of
cholera is disclosed by recent investigations
in the Hamburg Medical Society with re-
spect to its propagation by flies, as reported
by a correspondent of the Manchester
Guardian. "Nine flies were captured
which had been in contact with infected
cholera material and were placed in flasks
containing nutrient gelatine. In six of the
nine vessels numerous colonies of comma
bacilli were successfully cultivated—of
course, from the infection conveyed by the
flies." A new danger, and the most diffi-
cult to cope with, as yet known, is thus
revealed to our health officers in battling
with the insect vultures that eagerly gather
to the feast of death—whether in cholera,
typhoid, smallpox, or other infectious
plagues. It had already been shown that
they are carriers of consumption. It has
been said that flies are scarce during epi-
demics of cholera or yellow fever. If this
be so, whether from fly cholera or some other
cause, the difficulty of dealing with the
flies will perhaps be within control. At all
events, the ingenuity of insect-killing in-
ventors will be in demand for the isolation
of hospitals and chambers of infectious dis-
eases.
