#### COL. GARTSHORE'S RESIGNATION

Sketch of His Military Career-Joined the Militia in 1870-His Successful Command of the First Hussars.

The resignation of Lieut.-Col. Gartshore from the command of the First Hussars, will be sincerely regretted by all militia men in Canada, and by all who have the interest of the militia at heart. As far back as 1870 he joined the Queen's Own Rifles as a private, and remained with that corps until In the following year he joined the Seventh Fusiliers, then commanded by Lieut.-Col. Macbeth, as lieutenant and quartermaster. He served subsequently as lieutenant in A company, captain in E company, and junior major until the regiment, under Lieut .-Col. Williams, was disbanded. In 1890 he transferred to the First Hussars as major and second in command. At that time the regiment was commanded by Lieut.-Col. Cole. For two years he served as major, and then took over the command of the regiment. This was in 1892, and as the tenure of command is five years, it will be ob-served that he has sexved three years beyond the regular time. While junior major of the Seventh Fusiliers he served in the Northwest campaign of 1885. During the past two years the Hussars have enjoyed the reputation of being the most efficient cavalry regiment in Canada. It has contributed two officers and 30 non-commissioned officers and men to the contingents now in South Africa. It is not known as yet who will succed Col. Gartshore as officer commanding the regiment The second in command is Major King, of Kingsville, who is a captain in the Mounted Rifles, South Africa.

The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Standard, telegraphing Sunday, "The Boers have taken every advantage of the mountainous nature of the country which marks the line of their retreat to Ladybrand. task of driving them is difficult, and it is doubtful whether they can be reduced to submission in a district so favorable to their tactics. I have visited a British outpost, the one nearest Brandfort. BOERS IN FRONT OF BULLER. London, April 30.-There is much restlessness among the Boers occupymore guns, digging trenches and sig-

bers that might be thrown against ROBERTS' OPERATIONS.

Gen. Roberts' operations are now conducted on so large a scale that the public is dazed and requires some definite result, like another Paardeberg,

to be convinced. When Thabanchu has been cleared of the Boers, Gen. Roberts can continue his turning movement, either direct by the north toward Winburg, or by wider bircuit, through Ladybrand, and in this way he can empty the Boer position of Brandfort.

GEN. CARRINGTON'S MOVEMENTS A special dispatch from Beira, April 27, states that the dispatch of Gen. Carrington's division to Rhodesia is proceeding as rapidly as circumstances will permit. Seven transports have already

landed troops and stores. GOOD ADVICE.

Berlin, April 28. — The Dresden Nueste Nachrichten learns from the very best source that at the conference held between members of the Boer mission and Dr. De Beaufort, the Dutch minister of foreign affairs, the latter did his best to con-vince the Transvaal delegates of the hopelessness of their mission. All the powers without exception have advised the Boers to make overtures of

peace to Britain.

The members of the Boer peace mission will sail from Rotterdam for the United States next Thursday evening. Dr. Leyds and Dr. Mueller will not ac-

company the delegates. The sudden decision of the Boer peace delegates to go to America is attributed to the fact that the gov-erment of the Netherlands, after sounding all the European capitals, told them they had nothing to hope

from Europe. BUGLE BLASTS.

Gen. Hunter is mentioned by some experts as the probable successor of Gen. Methuen, but there is no official authority for the rumor. dispatch to the London Daily News from Pretoria says that 200 British prisoners are sick with fever and
