Colored Woman Arrested for Vagrancy Proves to be the Victim of the Glencoe Outrage.

Yesterday an item appeared in The Advertiser relative to the arrest and sentencing of a colored woman, giving the name of Sarah Jane Johnson. THE CHINESE SITUATION

the Diocese of Huron, will officiate at Practically Unchanged, But Still Very Grave-Attention Turned to Shanghai.

> Washington, Aug. 11 .- The gravity of the Chinese situation was in no way abated by the developments of today. United States Minister Conger, transtion practically was unchanged, and the minister was maintaining a stout heart in his present ordeal. For the moment attention is strongly directed toward the situation at Shanghai, where Vice-Admiral Seymour has determined to land British troops. southern viceroys of China, including Li Hung Chang, have united in a communication to Washington, asking that the United States use its good offices with the powers towards seeing that foreign forces are not landed at Shanghai. The message develops the fact for the first time that an agreement was made about one month ago, under which the protection of the city of Shanghai was placed in the care of the foreign authorities. It is pointed out that this protection is ample at present, there being twenty warships in the offing. A member of the cabinet said today: "Li Hung Chang may immediately put himself in communication with some of the powers, but it

will not affect present plans until our legations are rescued.' The total number of allies in the province of Pe Chi Li is 38,000, with 114 guns. The total by Aug. 30 is expected

to be 78,000, with 280 guns.

A special dispatch from St. Petersburg attributes to Russia the intention to fill Manchuria with troops, and not to let go of that territory when the present ebullition is over. The Russian war office expects to

have 142,000 men and 242 guns in Siberia by the end of September. Shanghai has received no news from Che Foo or Tien Tsin today, but a dispatch boat is expected at Che Foo

DON'T LIKE IT

Viceroys of China Want Landing of British Troops at Shanghai Stopped.

Washington, Aug. 11 .- The viceroys of China, including Li Hung Chang, have addressed a request to the United States Government to use its good offices with the powers to stop the landing of foreign troops at Shanghai. The document states that an agreement was made about a month ago by which the foreign governments exercised the right of protection over the city of Shanghai. This protection, it is claimed, can be amply carried out without the landing of troops. The viceroys state that 20 foreign warships are now in the harbor, and are able to protect the interests of foreigners and main-tain order. The viceroys also urge Wortman & Ward's, cut his left hand that the landing of troops will incite disorder.


