Comment on the "Curfew Bell"-The

[From Our Own Representative.]

THE CURPEW BELL.

When Hos. Mr. Girsen's bill for the better protection of children was before the House, Mr. Whitney protested against the passage of the clause providing that, with the consent of municipalities, the "curfew bell" shall be rang at 9 o'clock at night as a signal for children to go home. He said that it was illiberal, unchristian and singularly out of place in a civilized community. The very name "curfew" dated back to the time when no pathaments existed, when the rights of the people were not acknowledged. It was the instrument used by the Norman conqueror to impose upon the conquered Saxon the domination which he exercised over them. An important opinion was given by Mr.
Noxon on the question of table allowances in Provincial institutions. In such institutions as the Central Prison, where the fare is meagre and suited for prisoners, he gave it as his opinion that it was not expedient to add to the stores the supplies necessary for the table allowances of superintending officials. The better system would be to grant a fixed amount and let the officials purchase for themselves. In asylums and institutions in which patients require a variety of all classes of food the supplying of table allowances did not complicate the stores, and was the most advantageous method.


