#### Mr. Whitney Again.

Mr. Whitney has given the public and himself a rest during the summer, and now returns to his regular business of vituperation and vaticination. In an address at Toronto yesterday he predicted that he would be premier wthin six months. This cheery optimism shows that his holiday has agreed with him. North Renfrew, it appears, is the silver lining on the cloud of Opposition prospects. We are told there is a chance that the Government nominee, Mr. Mackie, will withdraw. Mr. Whitney admits that he would have regarded Mr. Mackie, a month ago, as "a strong and dangerous candidate," but if he (Mackie) does consent to run now, he will not be nearly so formidable. The explanation of this rapid slump in Mr. Mackie's popularity is not given, but it may be because Mr. Whitney has taken the field again. Mr. Whitney has also the hope that a disgruntled Liberal will come forward in the same riding to split the party vote. But failing North Renfrew, he has it figured to a certainty that the Governmen must lose in the bye-elections. At the very outside, he says, only one Opposition member can be unseated, while every protest against a Liberal will succeed. Against optimism of this kind, what can prevail? The same thing was said before the bye-elections of 1898, and the sequel should be a warning, but, of course, it is a leader's function to inspire confidence in his following, whether he has it himself or not. On the present occasion it is especially necessary, in order to induce another flow of cash for the election courts, many of the moneyed men of the party being reluctant to shell out against after the experience of 1898. Having ascribed the Government's bye-election victories in the past to the nefarious work of the machine, Mr. Whitney found it expedient, in the role of prophet, to discount its present power for evil. He declared he did not believe the ballot would be stolen in the ensuing bye-elections, and framed for their protection. not more than the ordinary corruption would be practiced. It must have cost a great effort to give the Liberal party this certificate of characer, but observe how quickly it will be withdrawn when the wicked Grits win the fight.
