St. Petersburg, June 29.-It is reported that the volunteer fleet cruiser Sartaoff has been burned at Odessa. Admiral Kruger's squadron is expected to arrive at Odessa tonight. His orders are to summon the Kniaz Potemkine to surrender, and, on refusal, to sink her, after which he is to assist in restoring order in the town.

A State of War.

St. Petersburg, June 29. - The Em peror has issued the following ukase addressed to the ruling senate:

Odessa and neighboring localities we have found it necessary to declare a state of war in Odessa and district and to invest the commander of the troops in the military district of Odessa with the rights of military authority and special rights of civil administrator tranquility."
