### PRISONER HIGH IN AIR

Top After Scaffold Collapsed.

Philadelphia, May 9.—One hundred top of a chimney, John Burnett balanced himself all day, a prisoner. At 7 o'clock this morning the scaffold upon which he was standing there gave way. It was 8 p.m. when, so overcome with exhaustion that he was almost in a collapse, he slid to earth upon a rope which a steeple climber had taken up to him, at the peril of his own life.

Burnett is an employe of a New York firm of chimney builders which is to tear down the chimney of a big manufacturing plant to make way for a new one. Just as he had been hauled up to the top of the chimney and had begun his day's work he heard the scaffold giving way. He leaped from the shaking platform

just in time. The planks beneath him crashed to the ground as he threw his arms over the top of the chimney. Burnett drew himself up and clung there as the long hours went by. Desperate attempts were made to rescue the man. Spikes were driven between joints of brick inside the chimney, but so many of them broke off, because the bricks were decayed,
