In fact, Japan is enjoying prosperity.

Mr. Nakada was a chaplain with a regiment through the Manchurian campaign, and he says that at the conclugion of the war hundreds of Russians, who had been taken prisoners, declined to return to their own country, preferring to remain in Japan. While they were being forcibly detained, the Japanese provided teachers for the Russians, and by this means many who were previously unable to read or write received a fair education. 
