The last few days have witnessed something like a panic in East Williams Township, due to the spread of a smallpox outbreak. The malady was brought into the township, it is thought, by Miss McCullam, a daughter of David McCullam, of East Willlams, who returned from the Northwest in a car where there were persons suffering with the disease. Miss McCullam did not appear to be touched by the disease, and she was allowed to go, though the rest of the passengers were quarantined. Sometime later Miss McCullam developed the disease, and her three brothers contracted i

Lately a number of new cases developed, Mr. R. Cowan first sickened of it, and though his family have so far escaped, of course, the danger of infection is great.

Miss Moore, a school teacher, a daughter of J. Moore, also caught the disease, and the family of D. Campbell, some six in number, are all suffering from it. Mrs. K. Rose, too, has contracted it, and her children are also sick, though in their case it is not thought to be smallpox.
