CANADA AND TREATIES

Asquith Says Dominions Wishes Re-

ceived Fullest Presentation London, March 9.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. John G. S. Nationalist South Donegal, asked Mr. Asquith whether the time had not now come for the concession to Canada by the Imperial Government of all the necessary powers to enable the Government of the Dominion to enter into direct communication with the other powers for the purpose of extending the trade and commerce of Canada The Premier replied: Canadian Government already does negotiate with the other British posessions. Sir Wilfrid Laurier about a year ago in the Canadian Parliament expressed himself as quite satisfled with the present practice of negotiating treaties with foreign Governments through his majesty's Government. I believe it to be im possible for any other arrangement to secure a fuller and more effective presentation of Canadian views and wishes than has been obtained in the recent negotiations about matters of Canadian interest with France the United States and Japan."
