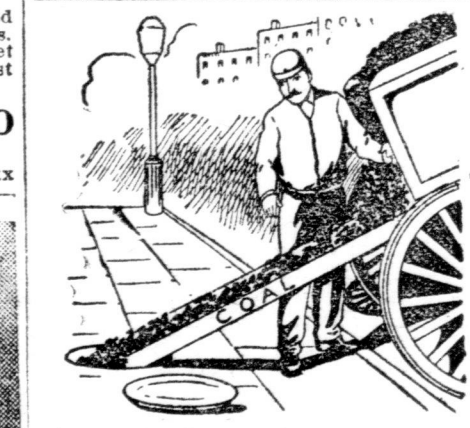

WESTERN FAIR OF 1909 OVER

Racing Card Friday Was Marred by Two Un-toward Events.

DRIVER JOHNSON WAS EXPELLED

"Fairview Belle," One of the Good Ones, Broke Small Bone in Leg and May Be Destroyed.

Friday saw the close of the Western Fair, and it was perhaps the most successful ever held by the association.

The attendance was excellent all the week, Thursday's being particularly good, establishing a record.

Yesterday there was a fair crowd at both the afternoon and evening performances.

The stands were well filled, and the attractions were pleasing.

The races were good, although they were marred by the only unpleasantness of the week.

Narrow Escapes.

Abe Johnson, driver for F. G. Westbrook, of Brantford, had a team entered in the team race. One was Jennie Price, owned by F. G. Westbrook, and the other was Wilhelmina, owned by Henry Horn, of London. The team won a heat, and in the other two were close up. Johnson was very intoxicated, however, and his condition was not noticed until the third heat.

In that mile he had several narrow escapes, and the judges were greatly relieved when he finished without mishap.

After consultation, it was decided in the interests of the owners of the horses to take him down, and put another driver up, as Johnson was abusing the horses of his own team.

Johnson was told to step down and out, but he refused, taking his horses off the track.

Driver Expelled.

He was expelled by the judges, and will not be permitted to drive another race in Canada or the United States. The action of the judges was warmly applauded.

With this team out of the way only two remained, those of J. W. Anderson, of Hamilton, and of H. Trudell, of Tilbury.

On the fourth heat, "Fairview Belle," one of the team owned by Mr. Anderson, overran herself, breaking one of the small bones of the leg. Her injuries were so serious that the team were withdrawn. It is not known whether or not she will have to be destroyed.

It is hoped that the mare will recover. Mr. Anderson had been offered \$1,000 for the horse, and his mate, "Miss Swift," prior to the race. Trudell's team merely marched over the course in the second heat.

The other attractions were carried out in their fullness, and pleased the audience greatly.

A Good Starter.

The starting was done by Mr. Ed. Baker, of the Canadian Sportsman, and his work was done well. His start in the team race was one of the most perfect ever seen on a local track.

The wagon trot was finished, and was a walkover for Robert Margrave.

HUCKSTERS MUST KEEP THEIR PLACE

Authorities Are Determined to Protect the People on the Local Market.

There is being a determined effort made to stop huckstering on the market and so protect the public who trade there. Despite the fact that there is a bylaw against it, it has become quite a common practice for men to come to the market, buy up large quantities in the early hours, and resell them to purchasers at an advanced price. It is readily seen how easy it would be for such men, by cornering some article, to put a practically prohibitive price on it, and it is to obviate this possibility that the present action is being taken. Yesterday one of the offenders appeared in the police court, and was let go with a warning, and it is understood that other names have been taken, and if the practice is not stopped these will be proceeded against.

Strange to say, the vendors who really suffer as much as anyone from the operations of these hucksters, seem to be very much in their favor, and are very much annoyed that this one man should have been proceeded against while there were others close beside him doing the same sort of trade, who were not molested.

The objectors also claim that there are a lot of bylaws governing the market that are absolutely unknown to the vast majority of those trading on the local market, and they think that if these are to be enforced through the police court, that these rules should be printed and displayed in places where it would be possible for the vendors to read them.

ANOTHER FINE WELL IS ADDED

Flow of 200,000 Gallons a Day Is Struck East of the Other Wells.

Another fine well has been struck by Hon. Adam Beck on the Hunt property.

This one will be known as No. 14, and is to replace No. 4, which was pulled.

Yesterday Driller Harvey tested the new well and it yielded over 200,000 gallons. The water was of the same quality as the other wells produced.

It is located east of the others, and is fully 500 feet removed from any of the other wells.

This materially extends the field and is important from the fact that it shows that the water stored in a big one, and the field is practically unlimited.

Another well will be sunk immediately. This will also be located at considerable distance from the others in order that the field of supply may be extended as far as possible.

Four new wells in all will be drilled.

A Queer Family.

Her husband stated last night at the inquest that he did not have his home very often, as he usually got them at the home of his father, Mr. Mendel asked regarding Mrs. Scott, and was told that she resided at home by herself or with her daughter. Asked if the meals were not sometimes very bad, he said he did not know, as he was not there very often. For eleven years, he said, his wife had lived in this way.

Daughter Interviewed.

Miss Clara Scott, the 15-year-old daughter of Wesley Scott, was seen by The Advertiser at Mr. Ebenezer Vining's home. She was greatly pleased at the rumor that her mother was to be brought to Thordale to attend the inquest, and said she would like very much to see her. On the day of the tragedy she saw her mother only for a few minutes, and Mrs. Wesley Scott told her that Harvey Scott had beaten the dog.

Miss Scott said she saw marks on the animal afterwards that looked as if it had been struck several times.

Set a Dog on the Child?

Her grandfather, she stated, abused Wesley Scott, Mrs. Wesley Scott and herself cruelly. She never remembered that the old man had done a kind thing for her.

One time, though, she said, "it was going down the road and he set one of his big dogs on me. The animal jumped at me and tore a big hole in an apron I had on, and ripped my dress. He was always unkind to me, and more to my mother."

Must Move Away.

As a result of the will, Wesley Scott will have to move away altogether, unless he can come to some arrangement by which he can rent or buy the little house and plot ground where his home has been since his marriage. The property by will now belongs to Arthur Scott, Alfred Scott's eldest son. Asked by The Advertiser what he was going to do, Wesley Scott stated that he didn't know what he would do yet.

Box Was Found.

The story in yesterday's Advertiser regarding the finding of a box in the drive shed is correct. Mr. Alfred Scott stated to The Advertiser yesterday afternoon that the box had been found. He said it was likely that it contained his father's private papers, and whatever money he might have happened to have around.

A TILBURY BLOCK MENACED BY FLAMES

Cold Storage Building Aflame About Midnight Friday.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Tilbury, Ont., Sept. 18.—Fire started in an ice house and cold storage building at the rear of Adams' butcher shop shortly after midnight last night and for a time it was feared that the east side of Queen street was doomed. A frame annex used as a storehouse by N. H. Smith in the rear of the Anderson Block was destroyed, and the roof of that block was badly damaged. An icehouse at the rear of the Mather's Block was badly scorched, and the block itself was damaged on the outside. A scaffold gave way, and fire and water is estimated at \$3,000, insurance \$2,000, in the Sun and Waterloo. Anderson's loss is \$1,000, covered by insurance in Gore and Montreal, Canada. Adams' loss on building and contents, \$600, insurance \$250, London, Liverpool and Globe. Matheson's loss, \$300, covered by insurance in Ontario Erie.

EIGHT MEN INJURED AT A BARN RAISING

Scaffold Collapses and Workers Are Buried Under Great Pile of Lumber.

Cobourg, Ont., Sept. 17.—An accident, which may result seriously to some of those injured, occurred at a barn-raising on the farm of Mathew Linton, near Blainville, late yesterday afternoon.

A scaffold gave way, and threw eight men about 30 feet to the barn floor. About 500 feet of lumber fell on those who had fallen from the scaffold, inflicting severe and serious injuries to most of them. Three doctors were soon at the scene of the accident.

AN EXPERT DECLARES DILLON WAS INSANE

Montreal, Sept. 17.—Dr. Shlirress, an expert on insanity, was the most important witness today in the trial of John Dillon in the court of king's bench for the murder of Constable O'Shea. He expressed the opinion that Dillon was suffering from mental inhibition when he committed the crime and did not realize what he was doing. There was an array of medical men in court, and it is the purpose of the defence, if possible, to prove that Dillon was insane when he committed the murder.

FUEL-SAVING STOVE.
