

FRENCH-CANADIANS HOT AFTER FOY

Association Takes Exception to His Recent Remarks on Bilingual Schools.

CALL STATEMENT CRUEL

The Right to Teach French Will Be Insisted Upon to the Limit, Says Mr. Tremblay.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Nov. 25.—Jules Tremblay, secretary of the French-Canadian Education Association of Ontario, this morning issued a sweeping statement in behalf of that body in reply to the recent remarks of Attorney-General Foy against bilingual schools. After quoting from Hon. Mr. Foy's speech, the association goes on to declare: "L'Association Canadienne Française d'Éducation d'Ontario (The French-Canadian Educational Association) desires to lose no time in expressing the great surprise of all its members that such a statement, involving as it does the cruel, arbitrary, unjust and sweeping denial of the elementary rights of a large section of the people of this province, should emanate from one holding the responsible position of attorney-general of the province."

"The association is as anxious as any body, or individual, that the English language shall be taught to all French-Canadian children of Ontario as thoroughly as possible, but it will, with all the constitutional means at its disposal, and with all the energy and activity it can command, insist upon the exercise of just those rights that are recognized to the French-Canadians, and which they have enjoyed for many years, with the sanction and co-operation of the department of education in Ontario."

Their Rights. "The enjoyment of these rights is amply warranted by the position held by the French-Canadians in the Canadian confederation generally, and in this province in particular."

"The association, furthermore, believes that a large portion of the English-speaking population of Ontario would view with alarm the proposal to enact a law that would prevent the teaching of French in the school system of this province, and a large number from taking courses in the higher schools as well as in the universities of Ontario."

"Neither can this association believe that the enlightened section of the people of this province is prepared to have it decreed that as well as all future Ontario generations shall be condemned to know but one language."

"The statement of the Attorney-General of Ontario is wholly at variance with the policy and practice of the British people all over the world."

TORONTO MAN'S BODY FOUND IN THE LAKE

Registered at Niagara-on-the-Lake Hotel Two Days Prior to Tragedy.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., (Nov. 26.—The body of Robert S. Lewis, 35 years old, was found floating in Lake Ontario, at Wilson, N. Y., eighteen miles from here, yesterday. Lewis was for many years connected with the Lehigh Valley Railroad at Toronto, having charge of the ticket office in that city. He is believed to have committed suicide. In fact, the chief of police at Niagara-on-the-Lake, where he was alive, reported to Coroner Walter A. Scott, who investigated the case, that Lewis had attempted suicide two days before he disappeared from P. J. O'Neil's hotel there. He had registered under the name of Robert Stevens. William Hamilton, the local agent of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, declared today that Lewis left his accounts at Toronto in excellent condition, and he could assign no reason for the man committing suicide. Lewis formerly lived in Lockport, N. Y. He has a surviving sister, Miss Mary Lewis, connected with the local customs.

LOGUE AT GENOA

Genoa, Italy, Nov. 25.—Cardinal Logue, archbishop of Armagh and primate of all Ireland, has arrived here and today proceeded to Rome, where he goes purposely to be presented at the elevation of Cardinal-designate Farley, who was born in the Diocese of Armagh, and is an intimate friend of the cardinal.

THE ARABS REPULSED BY BRAVE ITALIANS

Stiffest Battle Yet in the Tripoli Campaign Occurred Yesterday in the Trenches.

Rome, Nov. 27.—There has been sharp fighting at Tripoli and Derna. The result of the former is not stated in the official dispatches, which say it began on Saturday evening by 600 Arabs trying to rush the trenches which were occupied by the Ninety-third Infantry. The Arabs were repulsed with a loss of 40 killed and 100 wounded. General Frugoni today in an effort to clear the oasis of the enemy, ordered the troops to advance and occupy Forts Meari and El Harmal. The former was occupied. There was lively fighting on the Italian right with Turkish regulars.

An unofficial report says the fighting was stiffer than any which has yet occurred.

The action at Derna took place on Friday. It lasted for eight hours, and the fighting was fierce. At the conclusion of the time mentioned the Turkish forces, after having suffered severe losses, fell back to Derna. Their losses were 12 killed and 40 wounded.

BLOCK THE STRAITS WITH SUNKEN SHIPS

Turkey Is Preparing to Obstruct the Fairway Through the Dardanelles.

[Canadian Press.] Constantinople, Nov. 25.—Should Italy attempt to force the Dardanelles the Porte has arranged to sink a number of Turkish ships with the purpose of obstructing the fairway. Turkish military officials are awaiting developments with composure. They declared that an Italian fleet would suffer such losses in forcing the straits that even the numerically weak Turkish squadrons would be further to reduce the enemy's effectiveness to such an extent that if it reached Constantinople it would be at the mercy of the Turkish forces.

The Ottoman ministers of war and marine are now in the Dardanelles seeing that the forts are being placed in readiness.

SUFFRAGISTS PLAN BABY AND COCK SHOW

Just to Prove to Ridiculing Men They Are Deserving of the Franchise.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Ill., Nov. 25.—To prove to ridiculing men that suffragists raise children, one of their main purposes, members of the Illinois Equal Suffrage Association have planned a "baby fair" at one of the leading hotels, with the main feature will be a baby show.

The women who would vote are also desirous of showing the stronger sex that they are not far away from a question of cooking. To show their proficiency in this line, a cooking contest has been arranged for the women. The contest will be a pie, bread, puddings, salads and biscuits, all the products of the suffragist cooks.

The "county fair" will last three days, beginning Dec. 7, and speakers who are known to favor "equal justice to all" will be invited to make addresses.

RUSSIA INSISTS UPON NEUTRALITY

Insists Powers Dardanelles Must Remain Open According to the Treaty of London.

[Canadian Press.] Paris, Nov. 25.—Russia today informed France and the other powers that she insists upon the neutrality of the Dardanelles, as provided in the Treaty of London in 1871. This neutralization follows the report that Italy is furthering the war against Turkey intended to blockade the Dardanelles.

LORD ROBERT CECIL WINS BY ELECTION

The Unionists Hold North Hertfordshire by an Increased Majority in Friday's Polling.

London, Nov. 25.—The Unionists have held North Hertfordshire, where a by-election occurred owing to the death of the late member, Dr. A. F. Elliot. In the last election their majority was 1,291, and this has been increased to 1,633. The Unionist vote increased from 5,233 to 5,542, and the Liberal vote decreased from 3,945 to 3,909.

NO EXECUTIONS.

Juarez, Mexico, Nov. 25.—The reported execution of two Spaniards, Juan Lorenzo, on the border east of the city, is strenuously denied by the local military authorities.

"No order to execute prisoners has come from President Madero," says Col. A. Estrada, in command of the Juarez garrison, today, "and any prisoners taken will be amply protected."

TWENTY YEARS.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—Convicted on the testimony of his own sister, the widow of his victim, Arthur Cornwell, a 25-year-old printer, who killed his brother-in-law, James Courtney, here last June, was found guilty of murder in the second degree. He was sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary. The trial had lasted three days.

Cornwell shot Courtney after a trivial quarrel, and his attorney sought to mitigate the sentence chiefly by dwelling upon testimony that he was intoxicated.

UNITE AGAINST NE TEMERE DECREE

Memorandum on Matter Issued by Committee of Protestant Churches.

Suggested That the Question Be Taken Before Privy Council for Settlement.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, Ont., Nov. 25.—"Let us unite as one man against any power that seeks to invade our wholesome marriage laws, to interfere with the sacred status thereof, and to breed strife and misery where holiness and happiness should reign. May God defend our rights."

Seven Canadian churches, and to defend our rights. A memorandum prepared by a committee appointed by one of the churches to deal with the ne temere decree, and after submission to the committee of religious communities has been approved and adopted on behalf of the following:

The Church of England in Canada. The Methodist Church in Canada. The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Baptist Church Convention of Ontario and Quebec. The Congregational Union of Canada.

Canada Yearly Meeting of Friends. The Evangelical Alliance. The completion was authorized by a representative meeting early last month. It sets forth an historical resume of the law dealing with marriage in Canada, and submits seven conclusions, the chief of which are as follows:

"1. Legal equality among all religious denominations is an admitted principle of colonial legislation; there is therefore given the free exercise of religion of religious profession and worship without discrimination or preference to all his majesty's subjects."

"2. A uniform system of laws should be enacted to regulate the procedure whereby the status of marriage should be created and evidenced, stringing as far as possible the laws for the solemnization of marriage to all the provinces into conformity."

"3. By such enactments every care should be taken to prevent illicit, secret marriages, and to compel by such means as may be legitimately devised that the same should be solemnized openly and publicly."

"4. That it be declared when such marriage status exists it can only be impeached under any statute that may be enacted by the Dominion of Canada, and that no common-law community or individual can otherwise question the legality of such marriage, discredit the parties to it, the legitimacy of the offspring, or the civil rights flowing from it."

"5. That if there be any matter of doubt or question of law to be solved, a case raising the question should be prepared by the Government and submitted at once for the opinion of the Privy Council."

"6. A question raised under the ne temere decree must not be permitted to degenerate into strife, in which the Protestant citizens of the Dominion, and the Roman Catholic brethren on the other. This would leave no part of our great Dominion untouched by factional contests. It is a matter of civil right, dear to all, and embraces a most solemn contract, in which it is well that all should acknowledge the blessing of which they may be de facto beneficiaries. In order to have the sacred blessing there must be a binding and open contract, without which there cannot be a sacrament of marriage."

"7. The civil law must settle the terms of this contract for all, by its statutes. Thereupon each church should add its blessing, but not mar or place impediments in such way as to obstruct the enactment of which all should join."

ACCEPT RESIGNATION

Rev. Clarence Richardson, Who Is Charged With Murder, Relieved of Pastorate.

[Canadian Press.] Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 25.—The Independent Baptist Church Society last night accepted the resignation of its pastor, Rev. Clarence Richardson, under indictment, charged with poisoning his wife, Mrs. Richardson. The action was taken at the regular monthly meeting of the society after some members of the church had been notified to accept the resignation, and the minister's renewed request that he be relieved of the pastorate.

SPENCER GUILTY

Springfield's "Jekyl and Hyde" Must Pay Penalty For Killing of School Teacher.

[Canadian Press.] Springfield, Mass., Nov. 25.—Bertram G. Spencer, Springfield's "Dr. Jekyl and Hyde," was found guilty this morning of the murder in the first degree of Miss Martha B. Blackstone, school teacher. Spencer, whose violent outbursts have been unprecedented in Massachusetts judicial history, received the verdict without emotion.

MARQUIS KOMURA DEAD

Noted Japanese Statesman Victim of Tuberculosis.

Tokio, Nov. 25.—Although the death of Marquis Komura early Saturday came as a great shock to the Japanese people, it was not unexpected. The marquis was a victim of tuberculosis. He was 55 years old, a Harvard graduate, his country's plenipotentiary in several foreign countries, including the United States, and foreign secretary in the Katsura cabinet during the most momentous period of Japan's diplomatic history.

He was one of those who negotiated peace terms with Russia.

SEULAH BINFORD'S PLANS.

New York, Nov. 25.—Seulah Binford, the girl who figured prominently in the Seattle trial, is living in seclusion here, preparing to submit to a psychiatric examination, which is to be performed at a New York hospital next Tuesday. Friends say that she has taken another name, and will try to lead a quiet and inconspicuous existence.

R. & O. COMPANY AFTER COLLINGWOOD PLANT

Shipbuilding Concern May Be Absorbed By the Big Lake Steamship Merger.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—When spoken to tonight, Mr. Rodolphe Forget, president of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company, stated that his company was negotiating for the purchase of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's plant at Collingwood, Ont.

"We have not yet completed arrangements," he said, "but expect within a few days to be able to announce the purchase."

A meeting was held in Toronto last week of the interests affected by the proposed acquisition of the Shipbuilding Company. The Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company, the Northern Navigation and the Inland Lines, which recently effected an amalgamation, were represented. It is stated that an offer for the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's plant was made on a cash basis.

PRESS OF GERMANY IS STILL IN A RAGE

But the Official Organs Have Taken on Milder Tone Over Anglo-German Affair.

London, Nov. 25.—Dispatches from special correspondents in Berlin and quotations from the German press show that Germany, especially the Pan-Germans, are still raging against England, but the official and semi-official organs have taken on a milder tone. There has been much wild talk of foreign affairs for the past couple of weeks, and France, Germany and England are waiting on the lips of the expected arrival of Sir Edward Grey's expected arrival on Monday. Sir Edward belongs to the school whose tradition is not to share secrets of the foreign office with the man in the street. Amateur statesmen insisted that some dark mystery overhung the expected arrival of Sir Edward Grey's description of them as of subsidiary importance to the main agreement, and their publication in order to dispose of idle rumors and clear the way for Monday showed that there was no particular reason why they should not have been published long ago. There is no reason to expect that Sir Edward's speech on Monday will be much more sensational.

SUSPICIOUS OF KAI

Neither Manchus Nor Chinese Trust New Premier at Peking.

[Canadian Press.] Peking, Nov. 25.—The position of Premier Yuan-Shih-Kai is becoming more intolerable daily. Neither the Manchus nor the Chinese trust him, and the Manchus are becoming more suspicious all the time. The moderates do not hesitate to say that if Yuan had remained at Chang Tzu Fu the court would now be at Jehol, and the rebellion ended.

Many Chinese believe that while Yuan is reassuring foreigners with a view to obtaining a loan, he is plotting the moderates with pretended pacific measures, he is in reality intent upon sternly crushing out the rebellion with force.

The continued fighting at Hankow, and in the vicinity of Nanking, taken as lending color to this belief. The imperialists, after an attack upon Hankow that lasted for 36 hours, were repulsed last Thursday, and driven back across the Han River, with great loss.

GENEE DEAD.

New York, Nov. 25.—Cable advice received by death in Germany of Ottilie Genée, one of Germany's famous actresses. She was 77 years old. In 1849 Frau Genée undertook a tour of the United States, ending at San Francisco, where she founded the first German theatre. She managed this theatre for fifteen years with great success until recalled to Berlin in 1864 by Kaiser Wilhelm who desired her to play in the Royal Theatre.

A GOOD SIGN

Y., Nov. 25.—The death from exhaustion of Miss Avis Smith Jackson, novelist and short story writer, was announced here today. She died yesterday at her home in Madison avenue, after having nursed her mother, who is ill with pneumonia, day and night, until the crisis of the sickness was safely over.

CHINESE AMAZONS

Shanghai, Nov. 25.—Women are joining the revolutionary forces, and are taking part in the fighting. In a batch of reinforcements which started from Shanghai last night to join in the attack on Nanking, there were twelve amazons armed with rifles, permission having been given by the rebel leaders to fight in the ranks.

STRIKE AT MONTREAL

Montreal, Nov. 25.—The bootmakers' strike at the Montreal Lockport Company, practically ended last night. The company, however, refused to take back several of the strikers, alleging that they had made trouble. They agreed to investigate the charges, and if the men were innocent they would be reinstated. The men were called out by officers at the intervention union as a result of trouble in the United States. It was practically a sympathy strike here, no demands having been made for more wages.

MANTELL BREAKS DOWN

New Orleans, La., Nov. 25.—Mr. Robert B. Mantell, the actor, has suffered a nervous breakdown, caused by grief over the death of his wife, who was Marie Booth Russell. Mrs. Mantell died at Atlantic Highlands, N. J., several weeks ago of tuberculosis.
