There is no doubt that Frank will be in the game every minute. That was one of the understandings when he took the position of manager. However, if Bierbauer demonstrates that he is just as good at first base as he was last season, he will likely be kept there for a part of the season at least. Of the recruits that are coming, only one of them will tryout for the first base position. This is Sparks, the Toronto boy, who played in the Coast League last season. Sparks is also a fielder, and it is likely if he get a place on the team it will be as an outfielder.

A BIG FIGHT FOR SECOND.

There is going to be a big fight for second base. There are at least ten new infielders due to report here next week, and as Brant has the shortstop position pretty well sewed down, the recruits will have to spend their time in landing either third base or the second sack. As third base is the more diffi-cult position of the two from a young ball player's standpoint, it is likely that the big fight will be for second. Jim Carr, the Oil City man, is one of the most likely of the new men for the position. From all reports, Carr is a great infielder, and is a valuable man to have on a team, as he knows the game thoroughly. He is a man of the Curtis Templin type, although it is to be hoped that he lacks Templin's temper. However, he is full of ginger, and is in the game all the time, and there is not much doubt but what he will catch a place on the team.

Charlie Nichols, who held down the position last season, will make a big effort to land it this year. He wrote to the local management a day or so ago, and stated that he would report here next Monday. Nichols has not yet signed a contract, but the little difference between the club and himself will be patched up when he reports.
