### MAYOR OPPOSES THE SURPLUS BEING USED FOR PEOPLE

Is Against Hydro Earnings  
Being Used on the Public  
Parks.

The parks department is hard up. General Manager Glaubitz says that unless help is forthcoming from some outside quarter, the roadways in Victoria Park will have to go without oiling this summer. The parks commission is averse to this, and recommended risking an overdraft if need be. Chairman Pocock at the meeting of the board of water commissioners Thursday declared in favor of making a grant of \$5,000 from the hydro department surplus to the parks. The question at once arose whether this would be legal. Mr. Pocock didn't think that the Hon. Adam Beck would object, but it so happens that he is in Europe, and it is not likely that the water commissioners will turn over the money until he returns. Mayor Graham said that only a part of the citizens use hydro, and that any surplus arising ought, therefore, to go towards reducing the rate to them, rather than for the benefit of the citizens at large.

Heating Spencer Block. A tentative agreement was arrived at between the city and water commissioners whereby the latter will move into the west wing of the Spencer Block at a rental of \$85 a month, provided satisfactory heating arrange-

ments can be arrived at. The estimated cost of improvements necessary for the purposes of the board is \$4,000. John Hayman & Sons will do the work. A discussion arose over the cost of heating. Commissioner J. H. Chapman thought it ought not to cost more than \$100 a year. "You can get heat from the Helena Costume Company or the Greene-Swift Company for \$100," said Mr. Chapman.

"But you must remember," said the mayor, "that the Helena and Greene-Swift people sell heat as a by-product. The city cannot provide it for that figure."

"One hundred dollars is ample," said Mr. Chapman.

"We want an understanding how long we can stay," said Mr. Pocock. "We could get a better place for less money, and with the heat thrown in elsewhere."

"But it wouldn't be as central for your sales department," said the mayor.

"It would probably be much more central," said Mr. Pocock.

Mayor Graham contended that in any event the cost of heat would only be nominal. The city would charge the water commissioners with a proportion of the total cost of heating the Spencer Block, calculated on the floor space in the water and hydro departments.

"We don't want a charge of \$500 or \$600," said Mr. Chapman.

It was finally decided to accept the city's offer.

Cigarette Smoking Is  
Rapidly Increasing

Ottawa, June 19.—The people of Canada last year smoked 975,325,501 cigarettes, an increase of nearly 200,000,000 over the figures of the previous year, according to figures computed by the department of inland revenue. In fact, the consumption of tobacco and wet goods has increased all round. The per capita averages are:  
Spirits—1.112 gallons, compared with 1.020 last year.  
Beer—7.095 against 6.598.  
Wine—1.21 against .114.  
Tobacco—3.813 pounds against 2.979 pounds. The figures for tobacco include cigarettes.

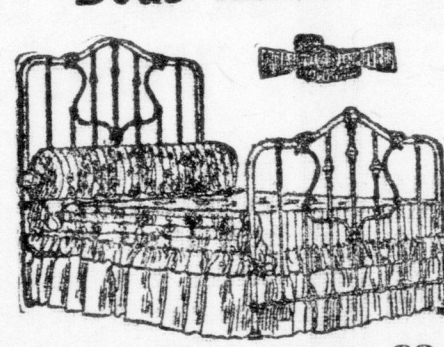

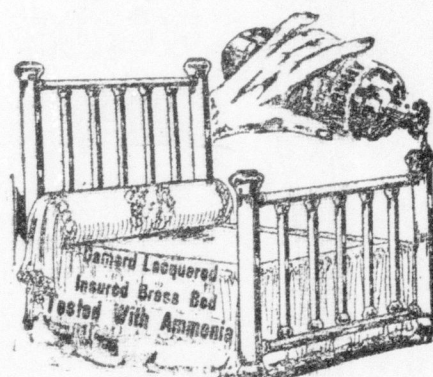
