RAPS INCREASED HOLDS FIRST OF UNION EXPENSES

Press Cable.—The Morning Post and the West, owned by Mrs. West; Gunga Yorkshire Post this week have each Din. owned by L. R. Malone been submitting an analysis of trades union balance sheets, showing that the expenses of the unions have increased over 100 per cent, a large proportion of which increase has gone to meet the cost of political propaganda. The National Union of Railwaymen heads the list with £255,000 spent ostensibly on management expenses, but only £97,-000 on benefits.

Leading union officials, so far, have not replied directly to these statements, although they point out that in the early years of the war very little was to increase the salary allowances of the union officials to meet the increased cost of living and traveling expenses. They also point out that the machinery of government now calls union officials to London to a much greater extent than formerly.

The Spectator today, however, says:
"The unemployed are encouraged to blame the government, but it is not what has happened to the large financial resources of their unions. Would not the money have been better spent in benefits to those in want, instead of been reached?


