

LEAVES PRISON WILL VISIT HIS DYING WIFE

Arthur Parmeter, Held As
Suspect in Toronto Hold-Up,
Withstands Ordeal.

LIVES CHEERING WORDS

TORONTO, July 13.—With his
life dying in the General Hospital
from cancer, Arthur Parmeter,
implicated in the Paton hold-up on
thrust street last week, has been
arrested in jail. But at last
the news that he might see his
wife.

This afternoon the meeting was
ranged, and Parmeter, in custody
of two detectives, left the city hall
for the hospital. Arriving at the
entrance, Parmeter displayed
emotion as he mounted the
steps.

Mrs. Parmeter, with features
marked by the dread disease, lay
down on the bed. So weak that
she was unable to rise to greet her
husband, she gazed at him with her
lustrous brown eyes. Parmeter
settled his wife with a smile and
sat down beside her. A detective

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TOT GETS DOLL AFTER RESCUE FROM GYPSIES

Father Brought To Sense of
Ill-Doing When At Con-
fession.

PRIEST ADOPTS CHILD

MONTREAL, July 13.—Saved from
a band of gypsies who were carrying
her across the border, and who are
still believed to have along with
them a little boy whom they kid-
napped, 10-year-old Lucienne Caron
has been adopted by her rescuer,
Rev. Abbe Mercier, cure of Saint
Cyrille, L'Islet County, and is now
happy with a brand-new doll—the
first she has ever possessed.

Lucienne was given away, or sold
or lent by her father, Eugene Caron,
a farmer, who has five children by
his first wife, and one by his second
—the little girl's stepmother. The
father denies having received any-
thing in exchange. He maintains
that he only lent the girl to the
gypsies for a month, and they said they
would bring her back within that
period.

In the Confessional.

The father was brought to a sense
of his ill-doing when at confession,
and willingly accompanied the priest
on his hunt for the missing child.

"Papa made me go with the lady,"
was the little girl's remark when
visitors called at the presbytery to
verify the story.

"It is incredible, but unhappily it
is true," said the cure. "The little
one has now been adopted by me, and
her father before witnesses has con-
sented to the adoption, which is at
her own request."

"Was your father good to you?"
the child was asked. "Oh, yes. He
never beat me." The child made no
response, and it was learned that her
mother had been dead five years, and
the present keeper of the farmer's
home is his second wife—the step-
mother of Lucienne, with whom she
was not very happy.

The child said the gypsy woman
who had come to her father asked
him for his name and address, and
wrote them down on a slip of paper.
She then took the little girl away and
as soon as she was out of sight threw
the paper away on the roadside and
muttered: "It will be a long time
before she sees her mother again."

Another Child Kidnapped.

The child confirmed a rumor that
had been abroad in the parish that
another little one had been kid-
napped. "We were going along the
road," she said, "when we met a lit-
tle boy. The gypsies invited him to
take a ride, and he got into one of
the caravans. Pretty soon he went
away."
