SEEK TO FOIL ATTEMPT TO EXTRADITE GROSSBERG

Montreal Lawyers Claim Attempt

MONTREAL, July 13 .- "The whole surpose of this case is to fix a preedent to extradite United States itizens from asylum in Canada for violation of the Volstead Prohibiion Law, offences against which are not extraditable," declared J. Stuart Bolin in the extradition court today, fighting attempts to extradite Harry A. Grossberg of Cleveland, Ohio, on forgery and perjury charges.

Mr. N. K. Laflamme, K.C., M.P., who appeared for Mr. Grossberg, with C A. Barnard, K.C., and Mr. Bolin, who was formerly district attorney at Columbus, Ohio, moved that the charges preferred by the United States government, and based on applications for permits for the withdrawal of liquor from government warehouses, be dismissed on the ground that the documents filed in court by J. A. Walsh, K.C., M.P., and B. W. Henderson, assistant district attorney of Cleveland, Ohio, representing the Washington authorities. failed utterly in creating a prima facie case against Mr. Grossberg. The hearing was adjourned.

BRITISH PAY U.S. SHIPPING CLAIMS

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Counterlaims between the British ministry of shipping and the United States Shipping Board resulting from wartime shipping transactions between the two nations have been settled with payment to the shipping board of \$12,000,000 by the British, Chairman Lasker announced today.


