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THE FRANCHISE BILL.

Speeches of Mr. Wilson and Dr. Moore, M. P.'s for York.

Delivered after Mr. Stockton's Amendment
To Grant Suffrage to Women.

MR. WILSON OF YORK,
said: I congratulate the Government upon the introduction of this measure. It makes very little difference to the people who will be benefited by the liberal provisions of this Act, as to the political views which mind the idea of the extension of the franchise first originated, so long as this enlightened measure becomes law. We are told that the old administration were first going to introduce a measure of this nature when, by a mere vote of the House, it was compelled to forego the development of its grand ideas. In view of what we have been frequently told, as to the grand policy which had been marked out and was just awaiting developments, it is, perhaps, a calamity for this country that no opportunity was afforded to mould the great principles in the form of legislation and give the people the benefit thereof. There is one thing, however, we do know: it was left for the present administration to bring in this measure, and to it the people will give the credit. The men who were just going to do something great are not the men the world has applauded. It is the men who have done something. A Government is to be judged by its action upon things, by what it makes of its citizens and what it does with them. The Government propose by this measure to give to the citizens of New Brunswick the right of franchise, and has heretofore been enjoying in the GOVERNMENT OF THEIR COUNTRY, to raise many from the position of disinterested spectators to the elevated position of a participant in the transaction of public affairs, thereby increasing the interest of each in his country and its welfare. Such is an enlightened policy too long delayed without any distinct intimation. The fact the Government seems to have recognized is the policy of education having been provided in New Brunswick for all, and sufficient time has elapsed to enable our people to obtain sufficient instruction to enable them to take an intelligent part in public affairs—the right to vote should be no longer withheld; in this policy the Government is recognizing the interest of each in his country, and in my opinion, the true criterion of the value of a franchise. Perhaps it might be well to require all to whom the right of the franchise is given to have sufficient education to place them beyond the necessity of depending on others for their information in public affairs. I think such education ought to be required in a country like ours where all have the opportunities of free education. It may be that our system of education has not been established a sufficient length of time to demand such a requirement. The provision of the present bill does not require it, but it is the

\$200,000 Paid in One Month.
