flour question. You will say that something which may come next year does not help the millers much now: and that while the grass grows the horse starves. True, indeed, but please tell us what you are going to do about it-beyond adopting our suggestion to get ready in good time and make a "big push" for next year Let us present to you several things which are worthy of being taken into your most serious consideration, in connection with the flour difficulty, as we admit it now to be.

Sir John says, truly enough, that the present duty of 50 cents per barrel on imported flour was fixed-or approved of-by the late Mr. Gibbs, after consultation with the millers; and that, therefore, it is the millers' own tariff. This is substantially what happened in 1879; but, as we are glad to observe, the Premier is well aware that conditions have changed since then. Ten years ago the Government did just as the majority of the millers advised; we are sorry to have to add that on this particular occasion the miliers made a bad blunder, as now they know full well to their sorrow. In 1879 they could have got a dollar duty as easily as 50 cents; and had they had the wit to ask for the former figure, it is not likel , that there would ever since have been any demand to speak of for its reduction. except to go along with a similar reduction by our neighbors. It is a thousand pities the millers did not think beforehand of changes which might happen, and that they did not see the prudence of having a margin of protection to come and go upon, instead of leaving the duty at a figure which would hardly do

when all circumstances were favorable.
