PRESENTATION TO COL. C. E. H. FISHER

His Staff at Post Office Remembers Retiring Inspector

TELL OF HIS KINDNESS

And Present Him With Umbrella and Cane

Members of the post office inspector's staff took occasion on Wednesday afternoon to tangibly express their good opinion of Col. C. E. H. Fisher, who to-morrow, after 53 years of service in the department, retires from the position of inspector of the London postal division.

The presentation took place in the Inspector's office just before the closing hour. Members of the staff gathered there and before Col. Fisher could grasp the purpose of the gathering D. J. McLean, the assistant inspector, read an address and Mr. Harris made the presentation. Though taken completely by surprise the retiring inspector replied, eulogizing the spirit of co-operation and harmony which has always pervaded the office and assuring his colleagues that he would long remember the kindnesses shown to him during his many years of duty.

THE ADDRESS. The address was as follows: "Dear Colonel: It is with deep regret that we, the members of your staff, are assembled for the purpose of bidding you an official adieu; personally we will only say 'good-bye' as we still hope and wish to meet and associate with you for many future years.

"We feel that your retirement from the service is a distinct loss, not only to the staff personally, but to the whole service at large. We also wish to assure you that we have seen and appreciated your untiring and conscientious efforts in all departments for the betterment of the service, and when we call of the Great General Inspector comes to you, as it must come to us all, you will hear that highest mead of praise given to mortals: 'Well done, good and faithful servant.'

"We wish to mark this occasion as a 'milestone in your journey' and would therefore request that, when using these little mementos which we ask your acceptance of, that they are only a slight token of the esteem and regard of the staff you are leaving."

PAPER MAKERS SIGN ARBITRATION PACT; WILL END THE STRIKE

NEW YORK, June 29.—An arbitration agreement was signed to-day by union workers at all the paper mills in this country and Canada with the exception of the International Paper Company. The workers had been on strike since May 1.

John P. Burke, president of the International Paper Company, and Paper Mill Workers, expressed the opinion that all the mills signing the agreement would have resumed operations in full by July 1.

CITES L. & P. S. TO PROVE ARGUMENT

Counsel Says Hydro Estimates of Radial Earnings Too Conservative

MR. MCKAY CONTINUES Radials Build Up Suburbs and Thus Help Selves

TORONTO, June 29.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—Robert McKay, counsel for the municipalities in favor of the projected Hydro Electric Power Commission's radial railways, continuing his argument to-day before the royal commission inquiring into the radial projects, contended that the hydro commission's method of estimating radial earnings was better than that of the United States experts who had given evidence at the probe.

The hydro statisticians claimed that the radial routes would serve the population of the suburban population than upon the size of the main terminal population, whereas the experts from the United States reached their conclusions by lumping the suburban and terminal population and considering the average number of rides for the total population.

THE RIDING HABIT. Mr. McKay, who claimed that the hydro estimates of the number of people who would patronize the electric cars were conservative, to prove his argument as to the averaging of the number who would have the riding habit he contended that 20,000 people added to the suburban area outside of Toronto would give a radial line more traffic than would the same 20,000 people should they be added to the city's population. That is, in normal times a very large percentage of a radial's business would be conducted with the people outside the terminal centers who are excessively and outlandishly conservative," declared Mr. McKay, after he had given more figures in favor of hydro estimates as against testimony given by experts from the United States.

Mr. McKay, who began his argument yesterday, had not concluded to-day, and he will continue to-morrow.

BRAVE FIGHT TO RAISE FAMILIES

Two Toronto Women, Evicted, Live in an Open Field

HOPED TO BUILD SHACK Relief Authorities Move to Find Shelter for Them

TORONTO, June 29.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—Forced to vacate a house they had rented jointly for \$12 a month, two women with their families of one and four children have been living in the open field since June 17.

A real estate agent is selling lots on the city's outskirts on a \$2 deposit basis, and the women got one of these sites and deposited their effects thereon. To reporters who visited them they said they were hoping to get enough lumber to put up a shack.

CLEAN UP CITY BUTCHER SHOPS

Board of Health After Delinquent 10 Per Cent.

REMAINDER ARE O. K.

Dairy Herds Supplying City Receive Attention.

The board of health has inaugurated a clean-up campaign among the butcher shops of the city and the dairies which supply milk to London are also being given special attention just now. While, according to Dr. C. S. Tamin, the butcher shops are 90 per cent. excellent, the aim is to make the other 10 per cent. conform to the same high standard or close them up.

Dr. Tamin stated that this is part of the plan of the board of health to enforce cleanliness in all places where food is offered for sale. Two butchers have recently been fined in the police court for infractions of the sanitary regulations and other prosecutions will follow if any person is found offering food for sale that is unfit for consumption, or even if such food is found on the premises.

GENERAL STANDARD GOOD. "The butcher shops are, on the whole, in excellent condition," said Dr. Tamin to-day. "But the board has decided that the few that may not be up to a high standard shall be looked after. The members of the board of health are determined that

London will be provided with clean food at any rate."

Dr. Tamin also pointed out that he is busy inspecting the farmers' herds now. Generally speaking, they are in good, clean condition, but in some there is room for improvement. Those which are at all unclean are ordered to clean up under the penalty of being forbidden to sell milk in the city. As a rule, they are anxious to keep their places in a perfectly sanitary condition.
