WILL ASK FOR \$6 A DAY.

High School Teachers Put Value on Examining Services.

The high school teachers will memorialize the government to raise the scale from \$5.25 to \$6 a day for examining papers.

The examiners met yesterday afternoon in the Normal school. Every department was represented, and the matter thoroughly discussed.

Some of the teachers were in favor of asking for \$10 a day, on the ground that the pay for other services performed for the government had been increased.

There were many others, however, to whom \$5 a day looks large, as it does when a man draws a salary of only \$800 a year. The opinion of the majority prevailed, and the government will be asked for the slight increase.

The question of a protective association among high school teachers for the purpose of demanding a general raise in salaries was not discussed by the examiners as a body. Privately and quietly the matter was talked over, and a high school teacher's union is in a fair way of formation.

So much educative work must be done that for the time the proposal is left in the hands of a discreet few to work out ways and means. It may be further discussed before the teachers separate for the year.
