

LAMBTON COUNTY W. C. T. U.

Annual Convention Held at Forest Last Week.

The Lambton County W. C. T. U. convention opened at Forest on Tuesday morning in the Presbyterian church with a fair representative attendance of delegates from the different branches of the union in Lambton County. Mrs. R. T. Maxwell called the convention to order at 10:15, and ably led the devotional exercises.

The appointment of committees was then proceeded with. Resolutions Mrs. Treadgold, Forest; Mrs. Boyington, Bridgen; Mrs. McHattie, Petrolia. Plan of work, Mrs. Lawrence, Sarnia; convener, Mrs. Neelands, Forest; Mrs. W. Anderson, Forest; Miss Polly, Wyoming. Credentials, Mrs. Medd, Forest; convener, Mrs. Harris, Petrolia. Courtesy, Mrs. Tripp and Mrs. Medd, Forest. Press reporters Mrs. Rowe and Mrs. Johnson.

The afternoon session opened at 1:30 devotional exercises being led by Mrs. McHattie, Petrolia. The following departmental reports were submitted, sailor work, purity work, flower missions, prison work, anti-narcotics, press work, work among lumbermen, evangelistic, systematic giving, and railroad work.

Mrs. H. Broughton extended greetings from the Baptist church, after which the convention song, "Some Glad Day," was sung. Mrs. Maxwell then gave an address reviewing the different departments of work. Tuesday evening session opened in the Methodist church, Dr. Medd acting as chairman.

The chorus sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus name," and then Rev. A. L. Beverley led in prayer. Dr. Medd gave a short address on the life of Francis E. Willard, also dealing with the temperance question. He predicted the abolishment of the bar because God was in the movement and said if ever there was a true child of God it was the W. C. T. U. After a ladies' quartette by Mesdames Vincent, Hamilton, Anderson and Crossley Miss Belle Kenney of Flora, Mississippi national W. C. T. U. lecturer gave an address entitled, "Who is responsible." She brought out many important points. The session closed with the benediction by Rev. B. A. G. Willoughby.

BY-LAW NO. 11, 1907 OF TOWNSHIP OF WARWICK.

A By-law to provide for drainage work in the Township of Warwick in the County of Lambton, and for borrowing on the credit of the municipality the sum of \$503.00 for completing the same. Provisionally adopted the 7th day of Oct., 1907.

Whereas the majority in number of the resident and non resident owners (exclusive of farmers' sons not actual owners, as shown by the last revised assessment roll), of the property hereinafter set forth to be benefited by drainage work, have petitioned the Council of the said Township of Warwick, to have the drain known as the McGill-Sisson award drain, (being in the fourth and fifth concessions, S. E. R., from lot 5 to lot 7 inclusive), repaired under The Ditches and Watercourses Act. The drain to be known as the Sisson Local Drain.

And, whereas thereupon the said Council has procured an examination, to be made by C. A. Jones, being a person competent, for such purpose, of the said area proposed to be drained and the means suggested for the drainage thereof, and of other lands and roads liable for contribution thereto, stating as nearly as he can the proportion of benefit, outlet liability and injurious liability which in his opinion will be derived or incurred in consequence of such drainage work by every road and lot or portion of lot, the said assessment so made being the assessment hereinafter by this by-law enacted to be assessed and levied upon the road and lots or parts of lots hereinafter in that behalf specially set forth and described, and the report of the said C. A. Jones in respect thereof, and of the said drainage work being as follows:—

To the Municipal Council, Township of Warwick.
GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with instructions received from your Honorable Body to examine the location of the drain hereinafter known as the Sisson Local Drain on the southerly portion of lots 5 and 6, con. 5, the northerly portion of lot 6, con. 5, S. E. R., and the 6-7 sideroad south of the Blind Line between con. 5 and 6, S. E. R., of your township. Following is an accurate description of its location: commencing at its head on the easterly side of the 6-7 sideroad 2 rods north of the Blind Line between con. 5 and 6, S. E. R., thence westerly parallel with said Blind Line to the line between the easterly three-quarters and westerly one-quarter of lot 6, thence northerly along the said mentioned line about 40 rods to the said Blind Line, thence in a north westerly direction across the west ½ of lot 6 and the greater portion of lot 5, con. 5, S. E. R.

It is now an open drain constructed under the Ditches and Watercourses Act and the parties interested have petitioned your Honorable Body to have it put under the Municipal Drainage Act with the request that if the engineer deems it advisable, it be made a tile drain or partly tile and partly open. In this respect I concur with their views and would recommend that a tile be laid beneath the bottom of the present drain following its exact course for the upper 30 rods, below which point the present drain becomes so crooked that I would recommend making a new straighter course for the tile by cutting off some of the shorter bends or turns and making them more gradual curves, still leaving the open drain to carry off the water as well as that of the upper 30 rods to carry off of frost water.

The proposed work of very though a little expensive will do away to a great extent, if not altogether with the necessity of continually repairing the open drain.

I also recommend extending the drain about 40 rods below the present end of the work, thus providing a more desirable and efficient outlet for the tile. This will carry the work down to a point about 30 rods below the line between the 6-7 and 7-8 of lot 5, con. 5.

I have chained, staked and levelled the drain in stations of 2 chains or 8 rods each for the upper 280 rods and 1 chain or 4 rods each for the lower 30 rods. The total length being 300 rods or 90 chains. Stake and chain links from stake "0" to stake "100" is at the head of the drain on the 6-7 sideroad and each stake is numbered the distance it is from stake "0" to the stake in question. Stake "100" is where it turns west across the sideroad and lot 6, stake 34 is where it turns north along the center of the 7-8 of lot 6, stake 44 is where it crosses the Blind Line, stake 50 is where the tiling commences and stake 90 is where the open drain ends on the west ½ of lot 6.

I would recommend that a 6 inch tile be laid along the sideroad from stake 0 to 10x70, a 7 inch tile from 10x70 to 34 and an eight inch tile the remainder of the distance to stake 90; the open drain below this will be ½ ft. bottom width with sides sloped 1 to 1 to 1 vert.

I have also prepared plan, profile, estimate of cost, specification of work and schedule of assessment on the lands affected, all of which I herewith submit.

SPECIFICATION OF WORK.

The contractor is to furnish all material required and all labor necessary for the completion of the work. The trench for the tile is to be dug with a perfectly even grade in the bottom and to follow the centre of the present open drain from st. 0 to 90 and from 90% to 80% it is to follow the line of stakes to be dug on the numbered side thereof and about 6 ft. to the bottom. The commissioner will set up stakes or pickets for the centre line of the trench, making as gradual curves as possible in all cases and the con-

tractor will follow these stakes or pickets for the line of the trench. Where any abrupt turn occurs the ends of the tile shall be bevelled a little by sawing them in order to make a closer joint more particularly at st. 10x70 and at 24. The tile are to be laid in a straight line with close joints and in perfectly straight lines excepting where bends occur. No tile to be covered up until it is inspected by the commissioner. It is then to be covered to a uniform depth of 1 foot where it is in the bottom of the present drain and to the full level of the natural ground where it is not in the bottom of present drain. The earth on filling over the tile to be tamped with a medium weight pounder.

The tile are to be of the best quality of agricultural tile and of the sizes shown and figured on profile. Build a box at the mouth of the tile for an outlet into which the tile will empty, to be 10 ft. long and 10 inches square inside, made of 2 inch pine or cedar, to have a plank over the end where the tile enters with a circular hole in same, the exact size of the 8 inch tile which will be inserted into it about 4 inches and then plugged perfectly tight. The trench for this box is to be made 2 inches deeper than that for tile figured on profile so that the bottom of the inside of the box will be level with the trench for the tile. This box to be thoroughly anchored in its position to the satisfaction of the commissioner.

The open drain from the mouth of the tile to st. 90 to be dug to the depths shown on profile, 2 ½ ft. wide in the bottom, side slopes 1 hor. to 1 vert., with an even grade in bottom throughout.

The earth is to be cast in the low ground and none left closer than 3 ft. from the edge of the drain.

The depths or cuts in all cases are from the ground beside the stake on the numbered side thereof and are to govern in preference to those in red which represent approximately the depth of the tile or open drain as the case may be below the present bottom.

Should any error appear in the figured depth at any stn., the grade of the bottom is still to be made to conform with that shown on profile.

All the work to be done, and material furnished to the entire satisfaction of the commissioner in charge of the work.

And whereas the said Council are of opinion that the drainage of the area described is desirable, therefore the said Municipal Council of the said Township of Warwick, pursuant to the provisions of The Municipal Drainage Act, enacts as follows: The said report, plan, specifications, assessment and estimates are hereby adopted, and the drainage work therein indicated and set forth shall be made and completed in accordance therewith.

2nd. The Reeve of the said Municipality may borrow on the credit of the corporation of the said Township of Warwick the sum of \$503.00, being the funds necessary for the work and may issue debentures of the corporation to that amount in sums of not less than \$50.00 each, and payable within 4 years from the date thereof, with interest at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, that is to say in 4 equal annual payments such debentures to be payable at the Treasurer's office, Warwick, and to have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest.

3rd. For paying said lands for benefit, and charged against the said sum of \$503.00 the amount of \$180.50 the amount charged against the said lands for outlet liability, apart from roads belonging to or controlled by the Municipality, and for covering interest thereon for four years at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, the following total special rates levied and collected (in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected) upon and from the undermentioned lots and parts of lots, and the amount of the said special rates and interest at each lot or part of lot respectively shall be divided into 4 equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed, levied and collected as aforesaid, in each year, for 4 years after the final passing of this by-law, during which the said debentures have to run.

4th. For paying the sum of \$40.00 the amount assessed against the said road of the Municipality and for covering interest thereon for 4 years at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, a special rate on the dollar sufficient to produce the required yearly amount thereof shall over and above all other rates be levied and collected, (in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected) upon and from the whole rateable property in the said Township of Warwick in each year for 4 years after the final passing of this By-law during which the said debentures have to run.

5th. This By-law shall be published once in every week for four consecutive weeks in the village of Watford, and shall come into force upon and after the final passing thereof, and may be cited as the Sisson Local Drain By-law.
