Notice to Box Owners on Rural Routes

Sections 16 and 17 of the Regulations the Post Office Department read as

16. The practice of placing money in the box to pay the postage which has hitherto prevailed is to be discontinued and the courier shall not be required to collect any mail matter which does not bear the requisite amount of postage. Patrons must furnish themselves with a supply of postage stamps which can be secured from the courier.

17. The courier shall not be required to sell less than twenty-five cents' (25c)'

worth of stamps at a time to any patron. Sarnia Wins Group 10
