Mr. Muir: If the Acting Prime Minister seriously and sincerely believes what he is saying, why did this memorandum only mention Francophone students from the province of Quebec and not the province of Nova Scotia where there are many French-speaking students?

Mr. Sharp: The answer is very simple. This is not the whole of our program.
