JAMES BAY HYDROELECTRIC DEVELOPMENT—ISSUANCE TO QUEBEC UNDER NAVIGABLE WATERS PROTECTION ACT OF APPROVAL FOR BRIDGE ACROSS BELL RIVER

Mr. W. B. Nesbitt (Oxford): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Transport which concerns the James Bay project. Yesterday the Prime Minister took the question as notice so today I will address it to the Minister of Transport. Would the minister inform the House whether under the provisions of the Navigable Waters Protection Act the Quebec government presented an application to the federal government for approval of the construction of the bridge that is now being built across the Bell River as part of the James Bay project and, if so, was approval granted by the minister?

Hon. Donald C. Jamieson (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, the answer is that an application was received from the Department of Natural Resources of the province of Quebec for a bridge to cross the Bell River at Matagami and this was approved on January 28, 1971. I want to make the date clear. I apologize to the Leader of the Opposition because I said I did not think anything had been received recently, but when we looked into the files we found the application was made presumably in 1970 and approval was granted on January 28, 1971.

Mr. Erik Nielsen (Yukon): Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question. Could the minister inform the House when the application was received by him?
