the senior staff. In addition, three regular colloquia for all, and numerous separate individual conferences are provided for this group by the staff.

Since 1895, <u>sixty-five</u> students have received their Master's degree (M.A. or M.Sc.) and <u>twenty</u> a Doctor's degree (Ph.D. or D.Sc.); <u>sighty-five</u> degrees in all, of which <u>thirty-two</u> have been obtained in the last five years. These <u>eighty-five</u> degrees have been taken by <u>seventy</u> students. During the last six years <u>eleven</u> of these students have come to McGill from other universities, usually as a result of the scholarships given by the National Research Council, which has also <sup>aided</sup> many of our own graduates.

## (d) In regard to Research Work

This constitutes another major activity of the Department. Each <sup>Near</sup> from <u>ten</u> to <u>twenty</u> investigations are in course of development, <sup>kanging</sup> from the lighter contributions of beginners to work of compara-<sup>live</sup> importance performed by Ph.D. students and members of the staff. <sup>It</sup> has been the policy to provide opportunity and training for investi-<sup>Rations</sup> in all the major fields of Physics rather than to concentrate <sup>9</sup> only one or two narrow fields.
