

PROF. LOCKHART: Yes, but, for instance, the Report suggests that more attention be paid to a group of manual training, more art, and things of that sort, but you cannot have all these things without you contribute something. We are working right up to the limit of the students' time, he is busy from eight thirty to four p.m., five days a week, and you cannot add more; if you do, you must take something off. I speak of the larger picture. These other things could be strengthened in some schools, we could find time for re-adjustment of the programme. Gertainly, we have to train for the kind of teaching that the course of study envisages. It is the same with music, art, ets.

DEAN HENDEL: Are not teachers obliged to attend University courses?

THE PRINCIPAL: In certain States, particularly in New York, there is what is known as Workshop experiments. Sofar, I think it is very helpful.

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DEAN BRITTAIN: About this proposal to increase the amount of time spent in teaching. There is a peculiar scheme advised here. How do they get this extra training, twelve weeks, or whatever it is. Could Prof.

Lockhart give us some idea of the feasibility of that scheme? He knows the situation in rural Quebec better
