BILL D17.

An Act for the relief of Donald John McGillivray.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Donald John McGillivray, domiciled in Candad and residing at the city of Verdun, in the province of Quebec, locomotive engineer, has by his petition alleged that on the tenth day of August, A.D. 1942, at the city of Montreal, in the said province, he and Mildred Eileen Shufflebotham, who was then of the said city of Montreal, a spinster, were married; and whereas by his petition he has prayed that, because of her adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved; and whereas the said marriage and adultery have been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that the prayer of his petition be granted: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

Marriage dissolved.

1. The said marriage between Donald John McGillivray and Mildred Eileen Shufflebotham, his wife, is hereby dissolved, and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Right to marry again.

2. The said Donald John McGillivray may at any time hereafter marry any woman whom he might lawfully marry if the said marriage with the said Mildred Eileen Shuffle- 20 botham had not been solemnized.
