Other Cities Have Not Such
Fine Back-
yards.

"American cities haven't the back yards Toronto has," declared W. S. Dinnick, president of the Doversport Land, Building and Savings Co., to a World reporter last night. SPLENDID MARCHING BY NEW BATTALION

Twelve Hundred Members of New
Seventy-Fifth Participate
in Route March.

Under command of Lieut.-Col. S. G. Beckett the 75th Battalion held a route march thru the city yesterday. Nearly 1200 men were in line. They left the armories at 11:15 a.m. headed by the regiment's newly formed brass and bugle bands.

The route was up the avenue to College, to Yonge, down Yonge to Albert, then down James to the city hall, around the driveway leading past the city hall steps, where Mayor Church, A. Claude Macdonell, M.P., and controllers and aldermen took the salute.

The majority of the soldiers are yet without uniforms, but their marching was good. Crowds gathered all along the line to see them.

Niagara camp yesterday afternoon. An advance guard of the 75th Battalion will go into camp today. The guard will parade at the armories at 8:45 a.m. and leave on the 7:30 a.m. train. The balance of the battalion will leave for Niagara next Tuesday on a specially chartered steamer.

EMPLOYEES GIVE AMBULANCE CAR

Makers of Russell Motor Cars
Will Donate to
Red Cross.

HEARTY RECEPTION

Idea, Endorsed by Lt.-Col.
Sweeney, Meets Entire
Approval.

Yesterday afternoon over 500 employees of the Russell Motor Car Company held a meeting in the courtyard of the West Toronto factory and unanimously decided to present an ambulance to the Red Cross for service in Flanders. Many of the officials of the company were present, and Lieut.-Col. G. A. Sweeney of the Red Cross executive delivered an address.

In introducing the colonel General Manager T. A. Russell impressed on the employees that while thousands were sacrificing their lives and all the things that men hold dear, it was their duty to do all they could to assist in the great world struggle.

Col. Sweeney in a brief but enthusiastic address said that there was no better way of contributing to the power of the Canadian troops than by taking care of their wounded. "Thousands of men have already been able to testify to the service rendered them by the Canadian Red Cross," he said. "I see no better way for you men of the Russell plant to show your comradeship with your fellows at the front than to present one of your ambulances that have already done such yeoman service on the battlefields of Flanders."

So remarkable was the enthusiasm shown that by last night all branches of the company had been heard from and the amount of \$2500 sent in. Each man through the Russell organization gives a day's pay. The ambulance, which has been approved by the Canadian Red Cross, will go forward in 30 days, with complete equipment, including four stretchers and extra tires.

ONLY THREE OPPOSED WURTEMBERG BUDGET

All Socialists, Except New Faction,
Vote to Continue Course
of War.

BERLIN, July 30.—(By wireless from Saville, N. Y.)—A despatch from Stuttgart to the Overseas News Agency says that the Wurtemberg diet closed yesterday after passing the budget, which was voted for by all the socialists, except three members of a new faction.

Prior to the taking of the vote the socialists formally declared that "in the event of a vote for the budget, the socialists would be forced to fight for the 'supreme' law in the country emphasized to the whole world the undeniable fact that the German people in the fearful struggle are united."
