### NO LET UP IN FIRM TONE DESPITE QUIET TRADING

Mining Markets Show Marked Steadiness at the Week-End - Hollinger Fails to Hold Its Own, But General List Does Better.

The mining markets relapsed to dulness at the week-end, but despite the considerable falling off in activity, there was no let up in the dominant firmness to prices. Both the Cobalt prime demand with no material amount of stock on offer in the exchanges. Consequently in certain instances where buying orders of big ex-tent were in brokers' hands, a bidding up of prices was necessary before sell-

The market on the whole has made The market on the whole has made satisfactory progress during the week, and has plainly borne witness to the in provement in the attitude of the public regarding the mining issues. There has been an excellent call for the favorites, and this has resulted in an adjustment of values on the upgrade. Meanwhile the higher prices have not brought about heavy liquidation, and therefore it would seem that stocks are held in strong hands. While natural reactions are to be anticipated from time to time, it is quite evident that prices are going to go higher, and therefore the brokers are advising the purchase of the securities of known merit, both Cobalts and Porcupines.

No Feature of Note

In the Saturday half-session prices moved along leisurely, with no features of any note evolving. In the Porcupine list a fair demand was noted for such stocks as Hollinger, Pearl Lake, Vipouli and Jupiter, with the lesser lights trailing along in the wake of the movement. 
