Herbert Capewell Retires in Favor of 54th Battalion O. C.

"Sam McBride and Sm Hughes will have nothing on me as a fighter for the returned soldiers if I am elected controller in Toronto," said Lieut. Col. Jesse Wright to a large and enthusiastic meeting of Central U.V.L., held at the Labor Temple last night. Col. Wright stated that he was in France with the 54th Battalion, that he reverted in order to get to France, and that he both trained and com-manded the 169th Battalion before going overseas at all. He mde 22 trips across to Britain as conducting officer

after the Battle of Passchendaele.

The meeting was both the best attended nd most enthusiastic of any held in a long while by the associa-tion, and heartily applauded J. Harry Flynn, when the latter dwelt upon a new gigantic plan for gratuities now under consideration

under consideration.

"Men," said the U.V.L. president,

"the gratuity question has not died,
will not die. Don't let it die. Eat it,
talk it, sleep it, dream it by day, by
night. Let me tell you that at a recent
round table conference held by representatives of eight of the largest re-turned men's organizations in Toronturned men's organizations in Toronto, including the G.W.V.A., all those present pledged themselves to stand by a resolution to petition and deputize the Ottawa government for gratuities granting \$2,000 to men or women with service in France or Mesopotamia, \$1,500 to those with service in Britain or Siberia and \$1,000 to those with service only in Canada. This resolution, which is to be finally revised and ratified at a conference to be held on December 29, will consider eight reasons why gratuities should be granted, and will also formulate two gigantic petitions, one to be signed by returned soldiers one to be signed by returned soldiers and sailors, the other to be signed by citizens at large.

Deputation to Ottawa.

Following the signing of these petitions a deputation composed of re-turned men's organizations thruout the Dominion will go to Ottawa and there deputize the government to action. For this reason I say that the gratuity has taken a decided step nearer to consummation for Canadians no matter where they enlisted. Already in New Zealand the government has by legislation granted re-turned soldiers £150 a year for every year of service recorded."

At this meeting Herbert Capewell announced that he had retired from the fight for controllership in favor of the returned man, Lieut.-Col. Jesse
