has issued an official notice to-day enforcing the Bait Act, which forbids Newfoundlanders to fish on board foreign vessels within colonial waters, and it intends to prosecute one or the subject of lengthened correspond-the subject o colonial fishermen who have been shipped by Americans outside the three-mile limit, after these men have been paid off by American vessels on which they were serving.

After this the supreme court is privy council will determine whether

the modus vivendi overrides the col-onial enactments. The government, furthermore, expects that threats of prosecution will deter the colonists from going beyond the marine boundary to join American vessels, and that the latter will therefore be unable As this would nullify the spirit of the modus vivendi, which agrees that mobody shall be penalized for joining American vessels, it is expected to result in trouble between the cabinets at London and Washington.

THE DIFFICULTY EXPLAINED.

Hon. A. B. Morine, now of Toronto but formerly leader of the opposition in the parliament of Newfoundland, and ex-minister of fisheries for the island colony, was the guest at the Empire Club luncheon yesterday. He explained at some length the recent disturbance in Newfoundland respectthe fisheries and contended that imperial government had shown to the colony every consideration. He more than intimated that the present outcry was largely a matter of local politics. He strongly favors the annexation of Newfoundland with Can-

"The fishermen of the United States resort to Newfoundland for two purposes: First, to secure bait for carrying on a deep sea fishery on the grand banks; secondly, to obtain herring for food purposes in the autumn and early winter, which fishery is known as the herring fishery, or the winter herring fishery," said Mr. Morine.

"The Americans have a right to fish of all kinds on the west coast, in-

cluding herrings, by virtue of the treaty of 1818. On the south coast cluding and the east coast they have no treaty rights. The winter herring fisheryso called-is, therefore, not only different from the bait fishery in the maner and period of its prosecution, and its object, but it differs in this harked respect—it involves difficult uestions of treaty rights.

"The words of the treaty of 1818 bearing upon this subject are as follows: It is agreed that the inhabitants of the United States shall have forever in common with the subjects of His Britannic Majesty liberty to take fish of every kind on that pay take fish of every kind on that part

"The method of prosecuting the fish. ery was as follows: American ves ery was as follows: American vessels eleared from ports of the United States with a fishing license. In Newfoundland they bought the herrings from local fishermen. The cargo so purchased when carried in American vessels was allowed free entry into American markets as the products of American fisheries. On the other hand fish shipped from Newfoundland to the United States were taxed for entry at the customs 75 cents a barrel—a prothe customs 75 cents a barrel-a prohibitive duty.
