Lima, Peru, Oct. 8.—A big fire started in Guayaquil, Ecuador, Tuesday, which threatened to destroy the whole city. At 10 o'clock Wednesday morning the fire was still raging. Among the buildings known to have been destroyed are four banks, all the foreign consulates, all the hotels except one, two churches, all the principal business houses, the military barracks, and the arsenal. It is further stated that Guayaquil has been burned from

The fire is believed to have been of incendiary origin. Some arrests habe been made. Many people lost their lives during the confiagration, and the losses are now estimated at 80,000,000 scores (\$54,400,000). The populace is furious and is demanding the prompt punishment of the guilty. Guayaquil is a bishop's see and has nine churches, a college, a seminary and several convents.
