THE BELL'S EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE.

The agreement with the Bell Telephone Company for a five-year exclusive franchise in return for \$1,000 a year and reduced rates for use of the following division: Yeas—Ald. Taylor, Belton, Jolly, Carrothers, Graham, Cooper, Dreaney, Wilkey, Nutkins, Gerry, Greenless, McCallum and Stevely. Nays—Ald. O'Meara, Douglas and McPhillips.

When the bylaw came up for the third reading, Mr. Macdonald, representative, Mr. Scott, asked that a portion of a clause relating to the rights in the city of telephone companies which existed before May 5, 1884, be struck out. He saw no reason for the objection, personally, as the clause was taken from the statutes, but he was acting on advice from the Montreal headquarters, where it was claimed the clause was unnecessary.

Ald. Dreaney moved to grant the request of the city solicitor. A portion of a letter received some time ago from the People's Company was read by the city clerk, in which the company urged that the best possible terms be made with the Bell Company. If the council could not favor it (the People's Company) with better conditions than at present enjoyed.

A motion to fix Dec. 1, 1884, as the date for the commencement of the \$1,000 rental was carried.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The Gridiron

Club on Saturday night gave a most

notable dinner, entertaining guests of

the United States, Europe and other

parts of the world. In the company

of the president of the United States,

members of the cabinet, the president

of Costa Rica, the premier of Canada,

the entire joint high American-Can-

adian commission, Gen. Garcia, the

most prominent officers of the army and

navy, senators, representatives and

many other distinguished men. More

than 100 people were assembled in the

beautifully decorated hall of the Ar-

lington Hotel.

The dinner was in a measure con-

ducted on lines of compliment and honor

to men who distinguished themselves by

both land and sea in the most satis-

factory conclusion. Speeches are always

short at Gridiron dinners, and there

was no exception to the rule. Re-

marks were made by the president,

vice-president, the president of Costa

Rica, Lord Herschell, Sir Wilfrid Lau-

rier, Secretary Hay, Secretary Long,

Postmaster-General Smith, Admiral

Schley, Gen. Shafter and Gen. Carr,

A WHITE DEER

Rare Luck of New York Hunters—

Bears Plentiful and Destructive.

Port Jarvis, Dec. 5.—The season for

hunting deer in Pike county, Pa., clos-

ed on Dec. 5. Over 100 hunters were

in the Westfall township, on Saturday,

Charles Quick, of Millford, and a

Matamoros hunter, had the unusual

luck of capturing three deer in one

day, and one of these happened to be

of a rare variety—a white deer. Only

two or three white deer have been

noted in the Pike county woods within

the memory of the oldest hunters. For

years ago a white deer was killed on

the Beaverhill, in Sullivan

county, by old Uncle David Horton,

who lived across the east branch of

the Delaware River from where it is

now called the Horton's Switch. The skin was sent

to Barnum's museum, where it was ex-

hibited. Horton always said that after

that his luck changed with the killing

of the white deer. He did not die an

untimely death, or anything of that

kind, but he never had so good luck

while hunting afterward.

Emmet Asher, proprietor of the

Lackawanna House, at Lackawanna,

Pa., shot his first deer near McKean,

Pa., early on Tuesday. He was com-

panied by a guide, they set out

well laden with arms and ammuni-

tion, and after wandering through for-

ests and gulches for some time, they

saw in the distance a white deer. The

two saw in a thicket the large an-

gular horns of a buck. Asher was

excited with the prospect, and ac-

cidentally touched the trigger of the

gun. He had leveled at the deer, dis-

charging it and sending the bullet down

the throat of the animal. When the hunter

recovered his surprise he perceived that

the deer was dead. It weighed nearly

200 pounds.

Some hunters while in the woods at

Westfall had rather a startling ex-

perience on Tuesday. A strong, un-

kempt-looking man came rushing out

of the woods toward them, shouting

and uttering strange noises. "Shoot

me! I am a deer," he exclaimed, and

before the hunters could recover from

their surprise he had disappeared in

the thicket. They were greatly alarm-

ed at the appearance of the man.

Bear hunting in Sullivan county has

been very successful this season thus

far, and a number have already been

brought down by the hunters after big

game. The beasts have been very de-

structive to cattle and sheep in Pike

and Monroe county towns. In Porter

township, South Carolina, a dozen cab-

bers have lost nearly a dozen cattle

and close upon a hundred sheep have
