ANY WRITTEN and spoken words are given currency with the greatest of sincerity in these days. We do not believe that as a whole the common people of Canada ever came closer to being spiritualized for the cause than at the present moment of tremendous crisis. One meets a Liberal who declares himself heart and soul with the policy of conscription. He looks upon the nation as a partnership for good or ill and he asks that the partners of his boys at the front do their share in the cause. Another Liberal fears a vital wound that shall still the voice of the people. He sees the menace of Roger-dodgerism again enthroned at Ottawa. He sees half the population of Canada set apart for three years and told that the war is none of their affair. He sees a vicious misgovernment and his soul revolts at the possibility of its perpetuation. One may travel the streets and the concession lines and everywhere the conflict of honest opinion is encountered. It is not a time for demagogues among men and newspapers to impute motives, on the one hand of Prussianism and on the other of disloyalty.

Sooner or later the people must decide the great issue. On the whole the people are less concerned with party politics than ever before. One party has failed in its attempt to conduct a war-time government on partisan lines, failed in every phase of government, and, worse than all, displayed at times a petty meanness toward affairs of state such as has nauseated men of both parties.

Men strike off the imaginary chains of party very quickly. And men's minds change overnight. At the present moment there appears no solution to the problems of the hour. The country is hopelessly at sea for leadership and no suggested leader seems to satisfy all. Borden has re-established Rogers and all he stands for. FEDERAL ACT HELPS PROVINCES ENFORCE PROHIBITION LAWS

Will Be Wrong to Advertise Through Mails in Some Provinces.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Aug. 7 .- Hon. C. oherty introduced a bill in the Comons this afternoon to amend an act aid of provincial elegislation prohibiting or restricting the sale or use of intoxicating liquors. The bill pro-vides that action against persons may either be taken at the place where liquor has been sent or in the province to which the liquor is sent.

A further amendment provides for the seizure of liquor in connection with which a conviction is secured. A with which a conviction is secured. A with which a conviction is secured. A third amendment provides for the prohibiting of the circulating of advertising matter for the sale of liquor in such provinces as undertake to prohibit such advertising. It shall be an offence to circulate such advertising through the mails to such a province. through the mails to such a province

"If the Province of Quebec prohibits such advertising," said Mr. Doherty.

Any penalty imosed under the first act shall be in addition to penalties provided fo under provincial prohibition legislation with regard to alcoholic beverages.
