

ANALYSIS SHOWS
DOG HAD RABIES

WOODSTOCK, May 12.—Official notification has been received from Dr. J. H. Tennent of London that the dog which died here recently after acting queerly and biting a horse was suffering from rabies. This conclusion was reached after an analysis of the head by pathologists. Dr. Tennent was in conference with the local medical authorities here today, and as a result it was decided to quarantine the horse bitten by the dog. No muzzling order will be put in force, but in the meantime the city bylaw preventing dogs running at large will be rigidly enforced.

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EXPRESS WAGON, MAN AND BOY IN MIXUP ON BUSINESS STREET

St. Thomas Citizens Complain of Danger of Wagons On Sidewalks.

LOOKING FOR CARS

Autos Stolen in Windsor Believed To Be in Railway City.

ST. THOMAS, May 12.—Another pedestrian was knocked down by an express wagon today by a lad's express wagon, and both the boy and the man had a narrow escape from severe injuries. The man fell over on the sidewalk and the boy, who was riding over the curb, was also injured. The people using the sidewalks are daily complaining of the stunts being put off by the boys and men who are passing by the council, protesting the use of boys' express wagons on the business thoroughfare. The man who went overboard this afternoon would have asked that the police interfere, but for the fact that the law was about as much frightened and hurt as he was. The chief will be appealed to for an ordinance.

THE HOLSTEIN SALE.
A large number of Holstein cattle breeders attended the sale of the Elgin County Pure-Bred Holstein Breeders' Association this afternoon at the Granite rink. There were some fine specimens of Holsteins offered and were taken at fancy prices. About 80 head of registered cattle, including some select heifers, the choice of some of the best herds in the country, were offered.

The gathering of the breeders marks the sixth consecutive sale of the association and was amongst the most successful of the series. The banquet followed in the cafe of the Hotel Talbot and was as interesting as it was enjoyable. The toast last evening was given to the Holsteins and dairymen.

BIG SALES OF PROPERTY.

Ex-Mayor S. Chant has sold his store on Talbot street east to Miss Medlyn for \$9,000. The store was a large stock and machinery, for \$14,000; \$9,000 for the buildings and land, and the balance for the machinery, etc.

WILLIAMS AGAIN CHARGED.
The former employer of Charles Williams, the Ross street plumber, in London and Davey have preferred a second charge against their former foreman of stealing \$2,000 worth of goods while in their service for the same.

DEATH OF N. S.
N. S. Lusty, J. P., born at Oakville, May 21, 1943, died yesterday at Rodney, and up to the time of his decease operated sawmill and was widely known as one of the successful lumbermen of Western Ontario. Mr. Lusty had been a member of the county council, deputy reeve of Aldborough. Four daughters and two sons survive. The funeral will be on Friday afternoon at Rodney Cemetery.

BULK SALES ACTION IN ST. THOMAS DIVISION COURT.
First of its kind heard in the Local Court—Adjourned.

ST. THOMAS, May 12.—A case of unusual interest was entered for hearing at the division court today, being a claim under the bulk sales act, the first of its kind heard in the local courts.

Ernest Southerner put in a claim of \$75.00 for sold liquors sold by J. H. Switzer, when he was proprietor and licensee of the Levey Hotel, owned by Stanley. The claim was made by Solicitor Maxwell that the case came under the bulk sales act, which requires a seller to give notice to the creditor of the sale of his interest in the business.

ANDERSON SUES TENANT.
James Beal, a contractor, sued his tenant, Claude Dunn, a C. M. R. employee, at the division court today for \$22.50 and Mr. Dunn put in a counter claim of \$21 for time lost in moving and for a stove new. G. S. Lloyd, plaintiff. The case was not concluded owing to the absence of documentary evidence.

MINISTER INDUCTED.
Rev. C. D. Farquharson Takes Charge of Two Congregations.

GLENCOE, May 12.—The induction of Rev. C. D. Farquharson to the charge of the Wardville and Newbury congregations took place here today. The moderator of the London Presbytery, Rev. J. D. Robertson of Moss, presided and inducted Mr. Farquharson.

Rev. A. L. Carr of West Lorne presided at the service. Rev. G. S. Lloyd of Glencoe, interim moderator, narrated the steps leading to the induction, and Rev. James McKelvey of London addressed the minister and the congregation.

Following the induction, the ladies of the congregation served luncheon at the town hall. Among several visitors were Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Nichol of Parkhill and Rev. Walter Atkinson of Mowbray. Appropriate music was rendered by the choir.

The charge has been vacant since last November when Rev. James Malcolm answered a call to a charge in the Toronto Presbytery.

The induction was delayed by consideration of a proposed rearrangement of the churches and by the influenza epidemic.
