WILL URGE BETTER WIRELESS SERVICES CONDITIONS TODAY FOR BRITISH EMPIRE

Declares They Shrank From Resolutions To Be Discussed Today Ask For Better Postal Rates.

> OTTAWA, Aug. 4 .- Governments of the British Empire are urged to secure dequate wireless services throughout the Empire by public and private enterprise in a resolution which will be discussed at the second imperial press conference which opens in Ottawa tomorrow. The conference, representing the resolution of the north side of George street, \$4.000, and for Duncan Ferguson on the north side of George street,

Governments will be asked, if the resolution carries, to lay down new cables and make increased grants to cable companies, but the resolution further affirms that the control of news services must always be in the hands of newspapermen and not subject to official influence.

The resolution will be moved by Mr. Robert Donald, vice-chairman of the British "delegation to the conference, and an alternative resolution will be moved by the chairman of the Australian delegation, Mr. G. E. Fairfax, as follows: be asked, if the resolution carries, to

"The Empire Press Union should use its influence to secure better, quicker and cheaper facilities for dissemination of news by cable, wireless or other methods throughout the Empire, the Government to assist in such provision. Such assistance, however, to be limited

to providing increased and cheaper cable, wireless and other facilities, all of which are declared to be essential to the strengthening of Empire relations."

Independence of new services and maintenance of privileges is deed. maintenance of privileges is dealt with in a resolution proposed by the Hon. Theodore Fink of the Herald, Melbourne, which follows:

"This conference affirms that the press and all news services be, and remain, independent of government or official control; and that the privileges secured during and since the war be maintained."
