CATTLE DROVERS AIR GRIEV-

ANCES.

Cattle drovers from Ontarlo and Quebec Provinces held a meeting here to-day in order to discuss the question of the responsibility for payment in the cases of

confiscated cattle. The drovers claim they have a griev-ance for the reason that since the coming into force of the Dominion Inspection Act the drovers have suffered heavy losses thru the confiscation of their cattle at the Ontario and Quebec cattle markets. A drover buying cattle in Ontario and sending them to the Montreal market for sale thru the medium of a commission dealer, has no way of tracing the cattle that are sold here, and when these cattle are confiscated the buyer comes back on the drover, who is compelled to make a refund, but the droven in turn, not being in a position to know which of the cattle was confiscated, does not know to which of the farmers from whom he has bought his cattle he must go for redress, and consequently he is out of pocket. 


